SPECIAL NOTE FROM OUR PRESIDENT

Mr. Henry Smilie, who has, by the way, recently been elected to the directorate of the Western Conference of the A.C.B.L., (Congratulations!!) wishes to forward the League's recommendations concerning publicity for local bridge events. Newspaper coverage in our area is lacking, to say the least. We can help our own cause in two suggested ways:

1. During local tournaments, players should call the City Desk of our local newspapers requesting results. (A tremendous flood of calls might stir them to action.)

2. Players should write letters to the editor, either acknowledging good newspaper coverage, or complaining (not too vociferously) about the lack of it. Standing on the steps of the Harrison Hotel, looking out over Harrison Lake, one wondered momentarily why he had committed himself to five sessions of bridge in the next day or so. The setting for the Evergreen Sectional couldn't have been 'more perfect", distracting as it was in its beauty. Some players found relaxation in a round of golf or a few hours fishing between sessions, but most kept their noses to the grindstone and played all five sessions, with the result that, once again, many of our people carried off the laurels.

Well, here I go apologizing again. We'll have to clear up the ambiguity of the second hand printed in last month's Matchpointer before we go on the the next. At trick five, after East had won the Heart Ace and shifted to the Spade King.... Would you believe that West overtook the King and continued a spade? Well, that's what Buddy said, so now we can all get some sleep.

This month's column is written by one of the Pacific Northwest's most esteemed players, Ron Borg. Both hands are deals encountered by Ron and Jim Donaldson in the Masters Pairs at the Evergreen Sectional.

Declarer opened the bidding with 2 No Trump and after two passes, my partner doubled. This action is not as reckless as it first appears since dummy will usually be barren and declarer will be hard pressed to come up with eight tricks in his own hand. It will be noted that the double was a three to one favourite to succeed because only a Club lead allows declarer to make his contract.

A Heart lead was out of the question since I never (or hardly ever) lead from four to the Jack against No Trump. The Diamond lead did not appear attractive. With calm assurance I led a small Club! It seems on reflection, now that I have an antipathy about leading away from four to the King in Clubs, that the only reasonable opening was the Spade King. The inherent problem with such a lead is that your partner and the opponents will be left with the impression that you are some kind of supernut; former partners will shun you; opponents will curse when you skip their table.....Anyone for golf?

In an uncontested auction, we arrived at an optimistic Four Hearts. (A better contract than the 3 No Trump found by many pairs.)

The Diamond opening was won by the Ace and three rounds of Clubs followed. The four-two break indicated a cross ruff was needed. The Diamond Queen won the next trick and I ruffed the continuation. My last Club was led and West was allowed to hold the trick as dummy and East discarded a Spade. Three tricks had now been lost and West could defeat me by leading the fourth diamond. The Spade King hit the table. (Better by far than a Heart) I won the Spade, ruffed a Spade and led the last Diamond from dummy. East ruffed with the Heart six, forcing my Queen. My last Spade was ruffed with the Heart Ace, East being forced to under ruff. It was routine and natural to finesse East for the Heart Jack to make the last two tricks and the contract.

Well, good-bye again....long-winded as usual. See you next time.
