
## FIVE CLUBS SHOWS NO ACES OR FOUR

The response of 5 clubs to a Blackwood 4 notrump is used to show no aces or, rarely, all four. There should be no confusion since the previous bidding should indicate the difference. The following example was reported in Japan during 1969.

Since South held all 4 kings and 3 queens he felt that his partner would hold at least 2 aces, perhaps three for his raise to 4 spades so he decided to ask for aces. North, who felt he had already bid too much, decided to deny possession of his solitary ace to dampen his partner's enthusiasm.

To South, his partner's 5 club response left no room for doubt that he held all four aces so he bid the grand slam. It should have occurred to him that an immediate jump to game over an opening bid shows a highly distributional hand with little high card strength but he had already conditioned himself to expect at least two aces. Because he was so convinced, he redoubled gleefully.

West led the ace of hearts which declarer ruffed in dummy. He drew trumps in one round, discarded three diamonds which West had to cover. When the jack of diamonds came down on the next round, dummy's clubs were thrown on the diamonds and thus a redoubled Grand Slam was made, missing three aces.



#### SPORTS CELEBRITIES BEAT THE U.S. ACES

It's true, golfer Frank Beard teamed up with baseball players Richie Ashburn, Tim McCarver and Jim Bunning and beat the U.S. aces 4 - 2 at a bridge exhibition held at the ACBL Fall Nationals on November 15th. Of course it might have been a different story if the sports celebrities hadn't been allowed a 15 second look at their partner's hand before the bidding on each hand and an extra 5 second peek when they were on defense.

## **CUTTHROAT BRIDGE**

Earlier this year, whilst in Montreal, your Editor had the opportunity to observe a very exciting version of bridge. It is of great interest to kibitzers, vastly improves one's slam playing skill and provides many opportunities for applying psychology.

There is no cut for partners since the partnership is made AFTER the bidding has closed.

After dealing normally, the bidding starts as usual with the dealer, except that on a player's turn to bid he MUST open with ANY 13 or more HCP. The next player after the opening bidder MUST BID AT LEAST 4 No Trump (unless that level has already been reached) and bidding may carry on from there. The auction closes when a bid is followed by 3 passes; doubling and redoubling takes place later.

The player who makes the final bid is ALWAYS declarer, and after the final pass he nominates one of the other three players as his partner. That player becomes the dummy and moves into the seat opposite declarer. Declarer's partner has the opinion of rejecting the partnership, in which case he scores with the defenders instead of with the declarer. Either defender may now double, and declarer (or dummy - if he has not rejected) may redouble.

A separate score is kept for each PLAYER, using a 500-point bonus for a vulnerable game and a 300-point bonus for a non-vulnerable game. Only plus scores are recorded, so no entry is made on the score of the one, two, or three players who are on the losing end of a deal. In the final scoring, each player has a reckoning with each other player. Honors are only scored by the player holding them. A player becomes vulnerable in the usual way. Scores are rounded off to the nearest 50.

When a vulnerable game is made, all players become non-vulnerable. Although the dummy, if he accepts, takes the same game bonus points as declarer, I suggest his vulnerability not be affected if declarer makes the contract.

It is best to circle the score of the vulnerable players as a record of their vulnerability and to draw a line across the score sheet after each rubber.

If a deal is passed out (or following a psyche) the cards are dealt Goulash - - - each player should arrange his hand with the red and black suits alternating in the order hearts, spades, diamonds, clubs. The four hands are piled together in any order and, after cutting once, dealt out five at a time, then five again, and finally three at a time.

A player may psyche (less than 13 HCP) an opening bid but if declarer picks him as a partner, then he first states whether he wishes to accept of reject declarer's score, but must add, "Do you wish to play opposite a psyche?"

If declarer does not wish to play opposite a psyche, then the psycher loses 300 if he has 4 or more cards in his suit and 600 if he has less than 4 cards in his suit.

If opening in a suit below the 5 level, there must be at least 4 cards in the suit.

If more than 4 people wish to play, then one player (following a rotation) drops out after each HAND.

Table talk is acceptable until declarer picks his partner.

#### TIPS:

- 1) Usually open 1 NT to avoid giving away information, if you must open.
- 2) Usually pick the opening bidder as your partner.

# VARIATION:

One variation called Razzel allows doubles during the auction and requires FOUR passes after the last bid.

No doubles are allowed after declarer has picked his partner in this version, but if one of the defenders had doubled his contract prior to him picking his partner, the double stands. A double may be followed by another double.

# CLASSIFICATION OF SYSTEMS AND CONVENTIONS **REVISED JULY 20, 1972**

## CLASS A

(Must be allowed in all ACBL sanctioned events and in affiliated clubs.)

- Blackwood, and conventions to handle interference with Blackwood
- Gerbei
- Grand Slam Force
- Stayman 2 Club response to 1 NT
- Lightner Double
- Takeout Double
- Unusual Notrump (by an unpassed hand must be at two-level or higher)
- S.O.S. Redouble
- Direct cue-bid for strong takeout
- 2 club opening, forcing, strong and artificial
- 2 diamond negative response to forcing 2 club opening
- Negative Doubles

#### CLASS B

(Must be allowed in events with Sectional or higher rating and in side events at Regional or higher-rated tournaments. It is recommended that tournament committees allow the use of Class B conventions in Open and Master events of lower rating.)

- 4 NT slam conventions
- 4 club slam conventions
- 2 NT over opponent's takeout double as a conventional raise
- Stayman 2 diamond response to 1 NT
- Takeout bids over opponent's pre-empts
   Transfers (Jacoby & Texas): diamonds for hearts; hearts for spades; spades for minors
- Gambling 3 NT (maximum one side stopper)
- Over opponent's 1 NT opening: Landy; 2 clubs for minors, 2 diamonds for majors
- 1 NT response to major forcing
   All defenses against opponents' conventions

#### CLASS C

(Must be allowed in Regional or higher-rated events. It is recommended that tournament committees allow the use of Class C in Sectional-rated events or side games at Regional or higher-rated tournaments.)

- Asking bids (suit control and trump quality asking)
- Flint
- Jump to 2 NT or 3 NT as forcing raise
- Jump and Double-jump shift to show forcing raise (must clarify)
- Direct cue-bid for light takeout or 2 suit takeout
- Responsive doubles
- Conventional responses and rebids after weak two-bids
- Conventional responses to natural strong two-bids
- Check back or delayed Stayman
- Ripstra
- Astro and variations
- Brozel
  - Calls which by agreement reveal a psych
- 1 club opening, forcing, strong and artificial
- 1 diamond negative response to forcing 1 club opening
- Drury

#### CLASS D

(Must be allowed in events of National rating. It is recommended that tournament committees allow the use of Class D conventions in Open and Master events of Regional rating.)

- Ace asking other than 4 clubs or 4 NT Responses to 1 NT: Murray 2 Diamond, August 2 Diamond, 2 Diamonds for minors, 2 NT for minors, Baron 2 NT, Stayman variations, Gladiator
- 2 diamond openings: Roman, Schenken, Precision, Stayman, Mexican, Flannery
- Flannery 2 hearts
  Double of 3 NT for lead of specified suit
- Negative Slam Double Opening 2 NT and 4 NT for minors
- 1 NT overcall for takeout
- Balancing 2 clubs for takeout
- Competitive Doubles
- Opening 4 Clubs and 4 Diamonds transfers
- Artificial and step responses to forcing bids
- Herbert responses to takeout doubles and 1 bids
- Roman 2 suit jump overcalls
- Roman 2 Club or 2 Diamond opening (3 suiter) at or near minimum opening
- Impossible negative

## CLASS E

(May not be authorized for use in other than extended team play - matches of 16 boards or more.)

- Strong artificial 1 Diamond opening bid
- Dynamic 1 NT openings
- TAM II 2 Diamonds
- Two suit non-forcing 2 Club opening
- Limit double
- Big Diamond System
- Pro System
- Lea System
- Roman System
- \* At 1972 Summer Nationals, permitted in National Championship events only.

"Recommended" conventions are permitted in events of the appropriate rating in the absence of specific prohibi-

tion by the sponsoring organization.

Conventions neither authorized nor recommended for the rating of the event may not be used except with the specific permission of the sponsoring organization.
