Our open team led by 12 IMP's after the first set of 16 boards and reduced this lead to minus 5 after the next set. By the end of the 3rd session they led by 84 IMP's and were never seriously challenged afterwards ending with a 91 IMP difference after 256 comparisons (128 boards).

Unfortunately our "under 200" team did not fare so well, they lost by 212 IMP's.

Following is a report by Peter Nixon on some of the more interesting hands from the open pairs. There are so many good hands that we will have to wait until next month for the conclusion:

Turning Point

Peter Nixon

Many bridge games have a turning point - that one hand that puts you on the winning path. Sometimes that hand is good bridge; sometimes it is not - always it is memorable.

We had gone into this 5th session up 70 IMP's, but Pete and I had lost (through bad luck, bad playing and bad judgment) 42 IMP's on the first five boards of the sixteen board session.

Then came this gem:

Explanation of the bidding: (For those who don't play S.A.)

- Gambling 3NT. Would you believe my king of clubs was in with my diamonds?
- I think I can beat this.
- Perfect opportunity for an expert-type advance cue bid.
- 4. Without the diamond king, I may not beat it.
- 5. Blackwood (what else?)
- 6. If I answer one ace, this guy is liable to pass me in 5D.
- 7. Correcting (?) to your suit, pard.
- 8. 6D doesn't look like our optimum contract; let's try this.
- 9. I can't stand this auction any longer!
- You're not going to believe this, pard, but this is <u>really</u> my suit.
- 11. Look, if you can double 6H with two hearts, I can double 6S with two spades.

- 12. You're right, I don't believe it.
 - 3. My turn!
- 14. I give up!
- 15. Me too!

South misplayed the hand and went down 900.

Our turning point had come.

After that hand, it might be unbelievable but there were many fine plays made by all players.

Now to calculate the percentage probability to hold any particular distribution and range of high card points, just use the two tables above, as follows:

For a Standard American 3NT opening bid, holding a balanced or semilanced hand and 25 to 27 high card points: First add the percentage obabilities for holding 25,26, and 27 high card points 0.03 & 0.01 & 0.01 = 0.05%. Next add the probabilities for a balanced and a semi-balanced hand 0.321 & 0.156 = 0.477.

Finally multiply these two figures together to obtain the percentage probability of holding the hand described before anyone has picked up their cards.

Probability = 0.05% x 0.477 = approximately 0.02%

Thus the chance of picking up a Standard American opening bid is about 0.02% or 2 chances in 10,000 which explains why most tournament players use a gambling 3NT.

Defense at the Roundup

As previously reported, the winners of the Open Pairs at the Roundup Sectional were Mike Strebinger and Joe Jabon. I asked Mike to submit one of the more interesting hands of the event and, typically, he selected one on which his partner's play decided the outcome. Here is his report:

Opening Lead: Heart three

The declarer played low on the table, East won and returned a low heart. Declarer decided to crossruff the hand and played the nine of spades upon which Joe Jabon sluffed a club rather than over ruffing (Not an easy play, knowing that your king is in the lock). Declarer now played the Ace & King of Clubs and ruffed another heart with the Spade ten. Again Joe sluffed! Next came the diamond Ace and a diamond ruff with the spade three. The position at this point was:

Now came the heart 10 from dummy ruffed by declarer with the spade Queen and (finally) Joe overuffed with the king. Declarer looked extremely startled and when a spade came back he had to reassess his position. Playing for an end play, he won the Jack of Spades in dummy and led the heart king. Strebinger won this trick and led the Queen of clubs.

Declarer followed suit to the Queen of clubs and Joe ruffed the good Queen and led back a diamond.

This promoted my 8 of spades putting declarer down two tricks. Declarer could have made the contract by pitching on the first heart return but almost everyone beat the contract 1 trick. It took the hold-off of the spade king to set it two.

ZIRINSKY

Victor Zirinsky of Hong Kong devised a formula for awarding victory points from results of team competitions.

His formula is:
 Winners' Victory Points = 6xA/B-2

Maximum of 8 VPs. where A= winners IMPs and B = losers IMPs

Losers' Victory Points = 8 minus the winners VPs

The reason for developing such a formula was that Victory Point scales often give unfair results. A superior team will gain an advantage from highly distributional hands producing slams, games, and part-score swings while the same team will be held to a narrow margin by flat hands.

Mr. Zirinsky's formula determines the Victory Points from the RATIO of the two IMP scores instead of from their DIFFERENCE, thus the winners of a high-scoring game need more IMPs for each VP they earn. This method has won acceptance for major events in the Far East Zone of the World Bridge Federation for matches of eighteen boards or more.

For shorter matches, particularly matches of twelve boards or fewer, the formula is not effective because low IMP scores such as 1-0; 9-5; and 25-15 all convert to 8VPs to zero.

This unsatisfactory result has been corrected in New Zealand by simply adding 3 IMPs to the losers score before applying the formula.

The Modified Zirinsky formula is thus

Winners' Victory Points = $6 \times A/(B+3) - 2$

Naturally a difference of 3 or less in the IMP scores results in a draw.

Modified Zirinsky gives sensible results for short or long matches and has been tested with excellent results in competition.



After winning the opening lead of the heart Q with his K, Ken Christiansen of Seattle disdained the diamond finesse and ran his clubs.

There is no defense against the squeeze, but I did my best to fool declarer by sluffing a low diamond early. Ken, however, is not easily fooled, and played his ace, dropping my king.

Finally, a "bread and butter" hand. For those of you not familiar with the term, a "bread and butter" hand is one in which there are no squeezes, fancy end-plays etc. ———— the ordinary every day type of hand on which players often take the wrong line. I'll pose it as a single dummy problem so you can try your declarer play.

If you won with the DK, cashed the DQ and took the heart finesse, you misplayed the hand. Even if the heart finesse works, you still have the same problems you started with, i.e. club guess. So why take a 50% chance of losing a trick? The recommended line of play is to cash DK and DQ, go to the dummy with the HK, play DA sluffing a heart and lead a low club. If you guess correctly, you can sluff a club and give up two spades.

BOOK REVIEW

More Killing Defense - Kelsey

Kelsey has added another to his impressive array of books. His previous titles are:

Killing Defense
Advanced Play at Bridge
Match-Point Bridge
and
Improve Your Bridge

This latest book requires full concentration and is not for the beginner unless the beginner expects to improve and is willing to invest \$2.45 (for this is the cost of the well-bound 192 page paperback published by Hart Publishing Co.) for his future.

He covers subjects not previously covered in any great detail elsewhere. Six chapters are devoted to discarding and four to the control of options.

Who has not made the wrong discard under pseudo-squeeze conditions. Kelsey comments thusly:-

"Pseudo-squeezes are rather more common than genuine squeezes. Look up the records of European, American or World Championships for any year you care to name and you will find many instances of slams made on a pseudo-squeeze against imperfect defence". He then goes on to give examples in the form of a quiz showing only your hand as defender and the dummy.

It is of interest to note that publication in North America in this case is either simultaneous or close to being so with publication in Britain also that paperback rather than hard back covers are chosen. The author must be anticipating a wide sale. In my opinion deservedly so. Within my limitations and on a cursory reading, the book contains only typographical errors which I can assure you are neither English nor Scottish spellings of North American words.

"PLEASE WAIT" or "ALERT"

There has not been great uniformity in the instructions reaching members on the approved alert procedure following a bid by partner about which you have a special partnership agreement.

The following is a brief history of instructions received regarding the terminology to be used when alerting:

June 1970 "PLEASE WAIT" Source: A New approach to Conventions by Edgar Kaplan (ACBL Bulletin).

May 1971 "ALERT" Source: Club Corner by Alan Oaks (ACBL Bulletin).

August 1971 "PLEASE WAIT" Source: Ruling the Game by Bernard Spiegel (ACBL Bulletin).

November 1972 "ALERT" Source: Meeting of National Appeals and Protest Committee at 1972 Fall Nationals as reported by Peter Pender acting Vice Chairmen of the Appeal's Committee.

In January 1972, in response to my request, I received a categorical statement from Mr. Spiegel that "PLEASE WAIT" was the only acceptable phraseology.

I prefer the term "ALERT" but from all the information available believe that until the ACBL takes a firm and final stand we must use the term "PLEASE WAIT" when we are alerting our right hand opponent to partners conventional bid.

JACOBY TWO CLUBS

Oswald and James Jacoby, who were captain and member, respectively of the North American Bridge Team which won the 1970 World Championship have introduced the following bid into Jacoby Modern.

An opening bid of Two clubs replaces the forcing-two bids in spades, hearts, and diamonds which are released for other purposes.

The two-club opening is a forcing bid. A response of two diamonds shows 0 - 3 high card points and the bidding must carry on to two no trump, three of a major or occasionally, four of a minor.

The two-club opening is made with balanced hands of 23 - 24 HCP or with 27 or more. In their system, with 25 - 26 HCP and a balanced hand they open 3NT. It is also made with any hand with which you would open a standard forcing-two bid.

With 16 - 22 HCP AND within one trick of game in your own hand, you have the playing strength for one of these forcing two-club openings.

The responses to this bid are simple and effective.

Two diamonds 0 - 3 HCP
Two hearts 4 - 6 HCP Two No-trump 10 - 12 HCP
Two spades 7 - 9 HCP Three Clubs More than 12 HCP

Any response other than two diamonds, is forcing to game. Opener makes a minimum no-trump rebid with a balanced 23 - 24 HCP and shows his suit with an unbalanced hand.

Armed with an ACBL club directory and a local area map we (eventually) arrived at the San Diego Bridge Club ready, willing, and (as it turned out) unable to "wrap it up"!!

Until now we had always thought that the only things relevant to a bridge club were cards, tables, good competition and good directors. 



Eight positions need to be filled since Henry assumes the position of past president. The nominating committee consists of Jim Andrews, Alina Pearman, and Mike Wilson. Any member other than the nominating committee may send the name of a person or persons with written consent to the Chairman of the Nominating Committee by June 1st. CONVENTIONS

"Becker"

Several years ago, a Mrs. Jones from Calgary wrote Thomas M. Smith then business manager for the ACBL Bulletin asking if Becker was allowed. This was the explanation she received: "In essence, the convention where a 2C overcall of an opponent's 1NT opening is a take-out for the minors and 2D is a take-out for the majors is a modification of Landy. If you should decide to use this convention, however, jot down on your card "2C take-out for the minors, 2D take-out for the majors" rather than modified Landy which does not adequately explain your defensive methods.

To the best of my knowledge this convention has never been described in bridge literature probably because it is self-explanatory. When you overcall with 2 clubs, you have at least nine cards in the minor suits (preferably 5 - 5 or better) and when you overcall 2 diamonds you show a minimum of nine cards in the major suits, which is slightly superior to straight Landy where the overcaller might have only four cards in each major suit. Responses to the overcall are not clearly defined and it would be up to individual partnerships to assign meanings to the various possible bids. I would suggest though, that over 2C, 2NT by the overcaller's partner should be invitational to 3NT, but over 2D it should request that the overcaller bid his longer major, at the game level if he has extra values. All suit bids at the two level over either overcall should be sign-offs, and at the three level, they should be invitational to game.

I have no idea who invented this device, but it certainly wasn't B. Jay Becker who is an apostle of natural bidding and is absolutely astonished at being given credit for this convention. This convention may be used in any class game where Landy is permitted."



MATCHPOINTING

First look at the EW final score column to determine the highest E-W score. If there is no tie, award zero matchpoints to the N-S pair. For each successively LOWER E-W final score award one additional matchpoint to the corresponding N-S pair until there are no more entries in the E-W final score column. Next look for the lowest N-S score (providing it is not zero for a passed out board for you will have already scored that pair) and award this pair an additional point. Now keep awarding one additional point to each N-S pair corresponding to successfully HIGHER scores in the N-S final scores column.

If there are any tied scores then share equally the scores which would have been awarded. For example if the next score you award would be 4 matchpoints and you find two scores are equal then split 4 and the next award which would be 5 and give them $4\frac{1}{2}$ each. If there were 3 ties then split 4 plus 5 plus 6 matchpoints which would give them 5 each but don't forget that the next award you give will be 7 and not 6.

After matchpointing all the N-S pairs then add all the matchpoint awards to see if they match the check total which is obtained as follows:

Check total= number of tables that played the board multiplied by the next lower number divided by two.

Incidentally, Average score = check total x boards played/round.

To determine the matchpoints, for the E-W pairs, subtract the number of matchpoints awarded to the N-S opponents from the top score which would have been possible on the board if there were no ties.

BRIDGING IN BRITAIN

Andy and I recently spent three weeks in England and were truly impressed on the bridge scene, not by the calibre of play but by the true bridge ettiquette at the table. We played 2 local club games and a "Congress", what would be a sectional here, and through 6 sessions saw only one display of annoyance when a fellow was left in a splinter bid, (one spade, pass, four diamonds, all pass!). Perhaps we English are really a cold uncompassionate lot, but I can only say that despite some atrocious plays, there were no emotional outbursts whatsoever. Psyching didn't seem to exist there. The ACOL System seems to open lighter than we would (often 9-11 points) and they use weak NT so that there were rarely pre-emptive bids either. It was actually in the 6th session that we heard our first "Director" call. We had noticed that leads out of turn and minor errors were handled quietly at the table by the players themselves. Beside the ACOL System, several Precision type systems, the Big, Blue, and Nottingham Club systems prevail. We marked our card Kaplan Sheinwold and receives some polite "Oh Really's" for our trouble. Afternoon sessions (beginning at 2:15p.m.) were interrupted at precisely 4 p.m. when each player was served a cup of tea and a cookie at the table. Everything really does stop for tea, in England.





LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

WINNING ISN'T EVERYTHING

Playing in the Master's Pairs at Spokane, partner and I came up against a couple of ladies from our unit. I've always found it a strange experience to play against people that I know personally in distant tournaments, because the informal rapport one can enjoy with the adversaries at a local club game just doesn't seem to exist at tournament level. The only thing that seems to matter is getting good boards, two at a time.

However, I sort my cards and after partner bids a notrump I raise to three on two small, ace third, king ten sixth, and doubeton king. They lead a club to partners jack so they should be in good shape if partner can handle the diamond suit. He heads the ace ace, low on my right low from dummy's K10 X X X X, and finally the jack of diamonds after considerable fumbling on my left. Partner now goes deep into thought and I worry about whether he has a spade stopper. He finally leads a low diamond up to dummy, and my right hand opponent smiles sweetly and significantly at her partner as she pops the queen of diamonds. Partner calls dummy's king with obvious relief as left hand pitches in. Dummy's ten of diamonds draws the last of the suit as partner and right hand each follow!!! At this juncture my partner was able to run all thirteen tricks for a cold top.

I found out later that our opponents could have won their section had not the queen of diamonds been put up on the hand I have described. My partner would have played the king hoping for a two-two break with the intention of falling back on the hearts and clubs to make his contract.

However, my right hand opponent was not willing to see my partner reject a restricted choice play in diamonds on the grounds of her partner's inadvertant hesitation on the first round of that suit.

Would that opponents were always so ethical. It makes me feel a whole lot better about being a bridge player. I'll have to buy one of those ladies a drink some time soon.


A FUNNY THING HAPPENED -
