Where Do You Sit at the Table? (third in a series)

reprinted from the Bulletin of the Ottawa Regional

WEST

Bridge just wouldn't be any fun at all without West. West is indeed a strange animal as he both loves to bid and to declare. His natural adversary is North as he disputes North's Godgiven right to declare every hand. Like the gunfighters of the Old West, our boy loves to force a showdown. West came to bid, and if he doesn't have the values to compete he is not above a psych or two. Wests aren't afraid of anything (even partner).

West relies heavily on his other half. As East tends to have his bid 98% of the time, this enables West to operate with some degree of safety. And operate he does, for West believes that "action" is the name of the game and that even a relatively tame holding can be made exciting if the proper stance is taken. West is a gambler at heart and loves to up the ante on each hand. Third seat is licence to kill.

As shoot-em-up bridge is his style, West adores strange bidding conventions. Anything that permits him to get into the auction early is bound to be on his card. It goes without saying that West is not often caught with his bid, but this rarely fazes him. West is known for pulling his partner's penalty double. He realizes that pard doubled on the information given him and (what else is new?) he didn't quite have what he promised. West honestly believes in "compensating" as East will usually underbid a little (also compensating). Occasionally, West loses control and goes on a bidding spree at which point the auction becomes a cross between the Twilight Zone and the St. Valentine's Day Massacre. But, life in the fast lane is not for the faint of heart, and West's motto is "keep 'em guessing!"



Where Do You Sit at the Table? (last in a series)

reprinted from the Bulletin of the Ottawa Regional

EAST

First of all, no one wants to admit to being an East. As West seems to prefer playing opposite an empty chair, this attitude isn't hard to understand. However, when a body is present on the East side he gets reluctantly cast into the role of a straight man by his free-wheeling partner. No matter how patient they are, most Easts find this very trying. When it dawns on him that West is operating again, East is capable of raising to the slam level just to teach him a well-deserved lesson.

East possesses a sly sense of humour which he will occasionally subject partner to, but most of the time he is too busy saving West from himself to exercise it. Saving West is a full-time job and East "rescues" a lot. Further to this, the only exotic conventions Easts are known to insist on are Brozel or Truscott rescues. (Easts demand some protection from partner's bidding.)

Easts tend to be rather well-mannered and just a bit shy, but didn't your mama warn you about the quiet ones? Sooner or later, the strain of being West's partner gets to be too much for even saintly East and his halo slips a little. Beware of being at the table when East snaps, for now anything can and will happen. Easts have been known to reach such high levels of exasperation that they psych a bid (with devastating results). Very few declarers ever recover completely from the shock of this action, because who expects such antics from well-behaved East? It's not wise to mess with an East, for they don't get mad--they get even.

I am writing this to bring you up to date on an issue which I raised several months ago, the implementation of a recorder system for our unit. The office of the recorder would be an appointed position whose responsibilities would primarily involve keeping a written record of complaints, concerns and allegations of unethical or obnoxious behaviour which occur at any event within the unit. The recorder might also consult with directors and club and unit officials to determine how best to counsel frequent and flagrant offenders.

The unit board has agreed in principle with the idea, but we have thus far received no information or guidance from the ACBL on the mechanics of setting up such a system, in fact our letters to them have been ignored. I have also written to another unit which has a recorder system, but have received no reply there either. Most frustrating!

However, the issue of establishing a district recorder is on the agenda for the next DINO meeting, so hopefully we may get some ideas from that source. While it would obviously be desirable to benefit from the experience of those organizations which have a recorder, I feel strongly enough about the need for such a system that I will recommend we pursue it at the unit level whether or not we get help from elsewhere. Whether this comes to fruition during my term of office appears doubtful, but rest assured that the commitment to maintaining a high standard of behaviour and ethics at the bridge table has not been forgotten.

I would just like to note that one of the positions which will need to be filled is that of Matchpointer editor, and to urge anyone who would be interested in doing this job to consider running for the board. Canadian pair take open title

A husband and wife from Vancouver added considerably to their enjoyment of a six-month holiday in Australia by winning the national open pairs championships which rended late on Sunday at the Lakeside anternational Hotel in Canberra.

From an original entry of 228 partnerships, only 28 had qualified for the 4wo-session trophy final. The Canadian visitors, Alana Skuce and Peter Herold, were comfortably ahead at the end of the first session and then did well enough in the second to stave off challenges from some of the top names in Australian bridge.

Other leading place-getters were R. Richman and R. Cummings (NSW) 2; D. and J. Wurth (NSW) 3; P. Lavings (NSW) and B. Glubok (US) 3; B. Neill and A. Walsh (NSW) 5; E.

Havas (ACT) and B. McDonald (NSW) 6.

In the other championship that ended late on Sunday the national women's teams title was won by Barbara Travis, Sue Lusk (SA), Jill Courtney (ACT) and Claire Lester (WA) who defeated a Tasmanian team in the grand final by 168 international match points to 94.

Now in progress is the main event of the 17-day Sitmar Summer Festival of Bridge in Canberra. 160 teams, each of four, five or six players, are competing for the national open teams title.

After two of 14 rounds in the Swiss qualifying stage yesterday, only three of those teams had recorded two maximum wins. Sharing first place with 50 victory points each were N. Guoth (captain: ACT), S. Andrew, D. Evans

and S. Mullamphy (NSW); M. Watson (captain), M. Borewicz, M. Courtney, J. Lester, P. Marston and P. Wyer (NSW); F. Theeman (captain), S. Browne, K. Bagchi, A. Kanetkar (NSW), S. Hinge and C. Hughes (Vic).

When the qualifying tournament ends on Friday the eight top teams will play off for the title during the long weekend. Also at stake are two places in a four-team tournament later this year which will select Australia's next international open team.

From Friday evening, the ACT Bridge Association is also organising a number of all-comers tournaments, suitable for players of all standards, as part of the festival. Details and entry forms are available from the bridge desk at the hotel and from the ACTBA clubrooms in Deakin.

The inspired 2D response paved the way to the grand slam. At tables where East responded 2C, auctions developed along nebulous "4th suit forcing" lines and it was often difficult to gauge the combined strength of both hands. Thus, 1S-2C-2D-2H (4th suit)-2S-3D-3NT-Pass was a fairly common auction.

Every bidding contest seems to generate at least one tragicomic moment. For example, witness D. Jacob-G. McOrmond in action on deal #21:

The participants seemed to enjoy the hands, as suggested by all the animated postmortems! It is hoped that next year's turnout will be even bigger and that other Lower Mainland clubs will share in running this event. Meanwhile, congratulations to Arbour-Vincent who can now enjoy bragging rights, till next year, anyway!

Other news:

The CBF Board of Directors met April 11-15 to decide programs and policy for the next year. A detailed report will appear in the August Digest. Meanwhile, here are some highlights of Board decisions:

- 1. Canadian Open Pairs. This event has been renamed the Air Canada COPC. The various fund games are no longer qualifying events for the COPC, rather there will be a 2 month club level qualifying period in September-October, starting in 1987 (for the 1988 National Final). The winners of the 1987 Final will win a free trip provided by Air Canada and probable entry in 3 European tournaments. The winners of the 1988 and 1989 Final qualify for the 1990 World Championships (with subsidy).
- 2. Unit Dues Increase. Unit membership in the CBF will cost \$2.00 per unit member. The 50 cent increase will go to the General Account to finance increased CBF Digest publication costs.
- 3. Bermuda Bowl Selection. The Board voted the CBF's final position: ACBL representation to the Bermuda Bowl shall be determined via a 4-team playoff, with one team representing each of the 4 ACBL countries. The top 2 will represent the ACBL, the winner receiving automatic entry to the Bermuda Bowl semifinal.
- 4. ACBL-CBF Relations. The CBF is to propose to the ACBL a new organizational framework for bridge in North America. This would involve creation of an independent national contract bridge organization (NCBO) for each ACBL country. The ACBL would become a federation of the four NCBOs and would continue to provide North American players with a monthly Bulletin and administer the masterpoint plan. Each NCBO would have the right to levy membership fees directly from players within its jurisdiction. A share of these fees would be paid to the ACBL to cover the cost of ACBL services.

The creation of a separate Canadian NCBO would open the door to federal/provincial funding, official government recognition of bridge and Canadian corporate sponsorship. It would mean simplified and efficient bridge administration in Canada: all business transactions would be in Canadian dollars, tournament surpluses would remain in Canada for the benefit of Canadian players, Canadian clubs would deal through a national centre, national teaching and other programs could be implemented. Overall, this reorganization would enable more successful promotion of bridge in Canada, greater financial opportunity for clubs and more complete service to existing Canadian ACBL members, all at little or no extra cost to individual players!

The CBF will put an initial proposal before an ACBL committee this July.

Women's Team Fund Raiser

The Unit 430 representatives to the Canadian Women's Teams national final have organized a fund-raising event, proceeds from which will go toward defraying their expenses.

The event will consist of 2 one-session pair games plus a buffet dinner and will be held at the Haida Club on Sunday, June 28. The games will be at 1:00 pm and 6:00 pm with dinner between sessions. The cost is \$8.00 per person for one session plus dinner, \$12.00 for two sessions plus dinner. There will also be a bar and prizes.

Formal preregistration is not required, but if you are planning to attend it would be appreciated if you would inform Marcia Kostynyk (581-1554) or the Haida Club (875-1714) so the quantity of food needed can be estimated.







"This requires some thought." Upon closer examination and after due deliberation the director said: "I can see two distinct possibilities here. Either the gentleman on your right is trying to make a 'pass' OR he has made a sufficient bid, in which case you CERTAINLY have enough to

And the auction went ONE SPADE from partner, DOUBLE from RHO. What would you bid?

E- *

D-xx

C-Kx

A small survey has elicited choices ranging from Pass (??), Redouble. 4Spades, 5 Diamonds, Six Diamonds, Six Spades, but only a few found Spike's call - TWO NO TRUMP. He decided to present his 'balanced' limit raise and listen to the auction. His LHO bid THREE HEARTS and pard skipped to FOUR SPADES. RHO now called FIVE CLUBS. Crawford figured he had heard enough so he spiked the lead with an imaginative SIX CLUB bid. His partner bid SIX SPADES and RHO DOUBLED. This ended the auction and RHO led the ACE of HEARTS. Here was the whole hand:

Ruff the Heart, play Ace of Diamonds, ruff a diamond with a big Spade, play a small Spade to the 9 in dummy and play good diamonds, pitching losers. As Spades are 3-1, only West can ruff the Diamonds and then Declarer overruffs, again with a trump honour and leads a carefully preserved Spade spot to the 10 in dummy.

Spike's colourful bidding had gotten pard doubled in a cold slam and had created an overtrick by spiking the club lead. PLUS 1860. A healthy overtrick... in theory. In reality, North found a different line of play and went MINUS 300. Next board.

THE CANADIAN WOMEN'S TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 1987 CWTC National Finals were held in Edmonton this July. Five teams represented BC although only 3 were originally slated to go. MCCULLY (Debbie, Marcia Christie, Sandra Borg, Sharon Crapko) placed 1ST in the Zone 6 Finals and GROOME (Jean, Connie Delisle, Sheila Dickie, and Jennifer Paynter) placed 2ND. The HARRIS (captained by Judy Harris) team from the B.C. Interior earned the right to go through being the Highest placed team at the Zonals from outside the Vancouver Unit. In the end, due to the nonattendance of some eastern teams, the 3rd and 4th zonal finalists were invited to attend: MCAVOY (Connie, Jude Goodwin, Rhonda Betts Leslie Gold) and ANDERSON (Ina. Marg Neate, Mary Fines, Ev Hodge).

The finals began, in Edmonton, as a tough 20 team round robin. Each team played 10 board matches against every other team in 6 sessions and 3 days. The playing area was a mezzanine overlooking the lobby - small, overcrowded, loud and smokey. When your match was done you quietly left the room and waited in the foyer below. As you paced and stewed you could watch the women descend the narrow flight of stairs, some jubilant, others obviously beaten, most displaying some degree of stress or exhaustion. Comparisons were done on the floor, against a wall or on top of a plano in the storage room. Evening sessions were accompanied by the beat of wedding music or evangelical gospel singing from the spacious ballrooms a few yards away. and the players battled with suits and ties and hallelujahs for space in the lobby.

The first day finished strongly in favour of the eastern teams. Only MCAVOY, MCCULLY and LOPUSHINSKY (Pat, Lucille Barton, Judy McGillis, Karen Killworth) claimed top ten spots for outside ONT/QUE. Dark horses BALCOME and MCADAM were leading the field but by Sunday the more experienced players showed their worth. The PAUL team (Mary Paul, Francine Simone, Dianna Gordon, Sharyn Kokish-Reus, Katy Thorpe, Gloria Silverman) and FRASER (captained by Sandra Fraser) team jumped 4 spots to 1st and 2nd trading back and forth for the rest of the round robin finishing FRASER 1ST and PAUL 2nd. LOPUSHINSKY fought blitzes and rainstorms for their 4TH spot. MCAVOY started slowly (as is their style) toying with spots 6th through 3rd, ending with a strong final 2 session winning all 6 matches and 3RD place.

MCCULLY waged war the 1st and 2nd days then dropped tiredly to 10 by the end of Monday's first session. However, they rallied for a good finishing session going +8,+22,+16 and cemented 6TH place. GROOME had a rocky row. netting two dead ties in a crucial session. They finished with a 50% game. ANDERSON drew extremely poorly the 1st day with disappointing results and never quite recovered. They did, however, win over MCADAM in a later match, giving MCAVOY their first taste of a top 4 spot.

THE 1987 CANADIAN OPEN TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

BC was represented by three teams at the recent CNTC national final in Quebec City this June. Two teams had qualified outright by finishing 1st and 2nd in the Zone 6 Final in Victoria this April. The BALLANTYNE, Aidan Ballantyne, Michael Strebinger, Gord McOrmond and Dan Jacob team, won the Zone Final and added Ron Borg to their team. The TOMCYZK, Gary Tomcyzk, Ken Bibby, Dick Grant, and Jacques Ribeyre, team finished 2nd in the Zonal and added Cliff Campbell and Don McClelland from Thunder Bay.

The third BC team, captained by Greg ARBOUR, included Laurence Betts, Jim McAvoy and Duncan Smith. Jim Dickied also played in the Zonals but was unable to play further. This team had finished 4th in Victoria and were the 2nd alternates only. Fortunately for the Arbour team (some might say unfortunately, considering the travel and accommodation costs) the team representing the BC Interior declined the opportunity to go at the last moment. The 3rd place team from the Zonals was unable to contact all its team members in time to accept the invitation. It is rumoured that one member of that team was incommunicado, sunning himself of the deck of his boat somewhere along the BC coast.

Thus the Arbour team was invited and eagerly accepted. They augmented with Zygmunt Marcinski and Michael Lorber from Montreal, who played a strong club system dubbed the Burning Club, a relay system the complexities of which are best left unmentioned. The only question was who would get burned, the opponents or the Arbour team itself. Duncan Smith decreed that it would have to be made clear to our new team members that they were BC representatives and he immediately dubbed-them Ziggy and Mike, later changed to Zig and Mikey for religious reasons.

The playing conditions in Quebec City were excellent but the accommo dations left a lot to be desired. Most players, the Arbour team included, were housed a long distance from the site which meant there were few opportunities to relax between matches or when sitting out.

As for the event itself, the format consisted of three days of round robin play involving 29 teams. Each team played one ten-board match against each of the other teams. The top four finishers in the round robin would enter the knockout stage of the event. The winner would represent Canada at the World Team Olympiad in Italy, fall 1988.

The ARBOUR team started slowly, but caught fire during the second day or the event and had pretty well sewn up a berth in the knockout stage by the end of that day. Indeed, the 4 teams which led at the end of the second day all qualified. The other BC teams did not fare as well. The Ballantyne team faded early and was never really a factor although a belated run on the last day enabled them to achieve some measure of respectability. Indeed, they had a mathematical chance to qualify going into the last match, but unfortunately not a realistic one. They finished 7th.

The TOMCYZK team did quite well considering it was their first appearance in the National Final. They were in serious contention going into the last two matches on the second day but a stretch of bad luck saw them blitzed twice in succession which ended their chances. However, they fought back on the last day and finished a respectable 8th.

Now for some hands. A good candidate for the best played hand came in a crucial early match against the GRAVES team (Alan Graves, originally of Vancouver, Peter Nagy, George Mittleman, and Eric Kokish). Laurence

With both VUL, North (Arbour) opened with 1NT(10-12) and South (Betts) bid 4C (Gerher). North showed 1 Ace and Betts leaped to 6 Spades. Note that only experts are allowed to ask for aces with a worthless doubleton in an unbid suit.

West (Kokish) made the best lead of Club Q, removing the only entry to the diamond suit. Laurence won the Ace and proceeded to run off six spades, pitching one club, one diamond and two hearts from dummy. Kokish's first two discards on the run of the spades were the 3 and 5 of hearts. The opponents were playing upside down attitude signals, so Laurence decided that Kokish must have the King of Hearts and the finesse was doomed. He therefore led the Diamond Queen. Mittleman correctly ducked the Ace. Laurence now played his last spade, discarding another heart from dummy and then carefully cashed the Ace of Hearts, extracting Mittleman's only heart, before leading another diamond. Mittleman, left with only clubs and diamonds, had to concede the last two tricks to the dummy.

Since the slam was not bid at the other table, the Arbour team gained 13 imps on the deal and won the match by 29 imps for a margin of 69-11 victory points. Had Laurence gone down, we would have lost 13 imps and would have emerged with only a 43-37 win.

The other memorable match was against the Defending Champions, the EDGAR team (Harmon Edgar, Michael Shoenborn, Arno Hobart, Marty Kirr, Greg Carroll and David Turner). We played them during the evening of the second day, when we were trying to consolidate our hold on a playoff position. On the very first deal, I opened 1Club (16+, any distribution) and Edgar, on my left, decided to bid one heart showing either spades or a three suited hand short in spades. Edgar was vulnerable and we were not. He ended up playing one spade doubled for -1100. Since the best we could do otherwise was play 3NT for +430, we gained 12 imps.

The rest of the match was fairly even. Before we started the last board, I got up from the table, thinking that time had expired and that the director had announced that we could not start another board. In fact, he had announced the beginning of the grace period. As I got up, Mike Shoenborn (known to everyone as the 'SHOE) suggested that I was trying to escape from the table, content with the +1100 on the first board. So I sat down again and picked up J108xx-x-xx-xxxxx . With both vulnerable, Laurence opened 1H, Shoe overcalled 1S, I breathed a sigh of relief and passed, and Edgar bid 2H(cuebid, strong hand). Laurence obviously had not observed my sigh of relief, since he now bid 3D and it went pass, pass, pass to Edgar. I tried to act nonchalant as I waited for the inevitable double (we would have gone for 1100!) but Edgar bid 4S instead. I doubled and Edgar redoubled. When the smoke had cleared, we beat them two tricks for +1000. Shoe was so rattled that he made a mistake in the play and went down an extra trick.



When we went back for the comparison, we saved this board for last. Duncan and Jim knew they had a bad result on the board, -200 in 4S doubled when they were cold for 3NT. They were very relieved to win 13 imps on the hand. We won the match 33-0 and 73-7 in VPs. Our team mate, Zig, pointed out that we had scored 'sticks and wheels' on the first board - a graphic reference to +1100.

We finished 2ND in the round robin, and played the MOLSON team (Mark Molson, Boris Baran, John Carruthers, John Guoba, and Eric Murray) in the semi-finals. We started out -14 imps, the carry-over from the round robin. The match was close except for the 2nd quarter, when Laurence and I had a bad set and lost 35 imps - the ultimate margin of victory for the Molson team. They beat us by only 21 imps over 64 boards plus the carryover.

Moison went on to beat Edgar in the final and will represent Canada at the World Championships next year in Italy. As for the Arbour team, we missed a golden opportunity, since had we beaten Moison, we would have had a substantial carryover against Edgar in the final. Hopefully, next year, when the finals are played in Vancouver, we will get another chance.

Now for a few thought from here and there... At the Spring Nationals in St.Louis this year, the ACBL introduced a new Regionally-rated event - the ACBL STANDARD CARD. In this event, everyone played the same convention card. It was fairly simple with 5-card majors. limit raises, strong notrump, stayman, transfers and weak 2s. Most who participated raved about how they enjoyed knowing in advance that none of their opponents would be using any unfamiliar or exotic methods. The League was encouraged by the response and is planning more Standard Card events at Nationals. I think that this is the 'way of the future' and would like to encourage our clubs to try a Standard Card Night! I have a copy of the Standard Card used in St.Louis if you wish to photocopy it for your club members... or design your own Standard Card (Haida Standard, Pemberton Standard, etc.) This card could also be valuable for use in regular games by last minute pick-up partnerships. The ACBL would welcome your comments on this and suggestions for inclusions or deletions from their Standard Card. Incidentally, the first running of this event in St.Louis was won by Vancouver's Rob Crawford, playing with Vancouver Island's Gary Tomczyk.

The international Epsom Pairs was enjoyed by many of us in its 2ND Annual running. The instant scoring and the unusual feature of knowing your exact matchpoint award after each rnd. made it even more interesting. This form of instant scoring will also be used in the ACBL 50TH ANNIVERSARY PAIRS on September 15th. However, I saw none of the post-game publicity that Epsom promised us would appear in the various media. Now, three months later, I still don't know how my 70.7% score ranked in North America, in Canada or worldwide. I also noted many people declined to fill in their age and vocation on the Epsom entry forms. This is a unique opportunity to conduct a world-wide survey of bridge players and could be valuable in promoting the growth of the game.

OPEN LETTER TO ALL MEMBERS OF UNIT 430

Although I am no longer a member of the unit board, I am writing this letter as a personal appeal on their behalf.

At the Annual General Meeting on July 19, 1987, a resolution was overwhelmingly passed, which, if ratified by the executive, will effectively ban smoking at all Unit Tournaments for a 2 year trial period unless accommodation can be made for smokers in a separate room. As I doubt this will be feasible, at least in the near future, effectively this will prohibit smoking in the playing area, period.

Although, personally, I still smoke and given a choice, prefer to be allowed to smoke at the table, for some time now I have refrained from smoking, even when permissible, if my partners or the opponents so requested. Unfortunately, however, some smokers think differently.


My observation, over the past several years, at the Club, Unit and District levels, especially here in Vancouver, is that non-smoking events have not increased attendance, and in fact may even have curtailed it. As a guess, I would say there are about 10-15% of our players who will not attend if they cannot smoke, perhaps a few less, who will only play if smoking is prohibited and the rest are either smokers who will go along with the restrictions or non-smokers who will tolerate a smoking environment.

It should be made clear that the ACBL and its Clubs, Units and Districts, are not environmental Protection Groups. Our job is to provide bridge events for the enjoyment of our members under circumstances that will attract the greatest number of participants possible. Although we are non-profit organizations, substantial revenue is required to maintain the number and quality of events we provide for your enjoyment. If this revenue falls short of what is required, something has to give, either fees must be raised, or activities curtailed to ensure continued operation on a break-even basis.

Now that the non-smokers have won the battle, I urge all non-smokers to support your unit board, and attend these non-smoking events as frequently as possible and encourage your non-smoking friends to do likewise. I also urge smokers to recognize the wishes of the majority and continue to support your unit even if you find it an inconvenience to wait until the end of the round or match, to get your fix outside the playing area.

Finally, as District President, I should point out that this resolution will not apply to the Vancouver Regionals. DINO has its own smoking policy which in effect gives preference to non-smokers at all times, but because of the greater size of Regionals it is usually possible to provide separate facilities for smokers and non-smokers alike, so in most events there will still be a choice.

Ann Scott, of Deep Cove , is one of our most popular players. Many may know her as the Caddy Master at our Sectionals. She and her husband, Terry, have been regulars on the local circuit for several years, playing predominantly out of the Pemberton Club. Some players on the road to Life-Master acquire their Gold Points well before they reach the needed 300 points overall, but poor Anne had been stuck on 24.68 golds for about 2 years, suffering the usual number of section 2nd's and 5 win swisses that always seem to haunt players needing their last golds.

I might have passed up the Ocean Shores Regional, but my DINO duties required my attendance Julie had work commitments that weekend, so I had no games arranged. A couple of weeks before the tournament, \boldsymbol{I} suggested to Anne that if she wanted to go, I would play with her, and we would hope for the best.

She went down with 299.14 points including her 24.68 golds. We played the Master Pairs on Friday but could do no better than a section 4th. Mission one accomplished. She now had her 300. Saturday, she played with Louis Landau in the Flight B Pairs, but drew a blank there, so we were down to the Sunday Swiss.

EVERGREEN SECTIONAL: Although we made a profit on the coffee, a never-before occurance (we now make our own) and Phil Wood helped greatly in decreasing our directors costs through using more local personel, we ended with a \$400 loss on the tournament. This is due largely to another drop in table count: 1985-343 tables 1986-264 tables 1987-259 tables. HOW TO GET YOUR NAME IN THE PAPER David Ingham

Here are two deals from a recent knock-out event. On the first, holding Axxx Kx AKx xxxx you opened one club, LHO overcalled two hearts (preemptive, but he's hot and your're not), and after an auction in which youthful enthusiasm played the largest part, you find yourself in six spades, with the lead of the spade jack.

S- A1074 H- K10 D- AK9 C- 8542	S- KQ9863 H- void D- J763 C- AQ6	You thank partner, more for his touching compliment to your play than for his dummy, and set abou finding a way to make it. You let the lead ride to your ace (RHO

follows), ruff the heart ten, draw the last trump with the ten (LHO pitches a heart), play the heart king, covered and ruffed, and (since one of your slim chances involves the Q-10 of diamonds doubleton), lead the three of diamonds: 5, A, 8. Now what? (Oh yes, by the way - you have to make this or you lose the match by 2 IMPS. But I wouldn't want to put any pressure on you.)

OK. Let's count this sucker. If LHO had eight hearts, he would have bid more; if he had only six, RHO would have. So give him seven. The diamonds look to be 4-2, with LHO most likely holding the doubleton. (With 1-7-4-1 he might have a)led his stiff; b) bid more.) Therefore 1-7-2-3. And the 3 had better include the King. Sure enough, club 2, 6,0,3. A ray of hope appears: if LHO doesn't unblock the club king, he can be thrown in with it: diamond to the king (no queen), club to the ace, club. LHO wins and has togive you a huff and a puff (whew!) LHO held J AQJ9762 84 K106 RHO: 52 8543 Q1052 J93

Partner, however, is unkind enough to note that you've misplayed it slightly. After winning the club queen, youmust cash the ace. Now even if LHO parts with the king, you can endplay either opponent: cash a diamond, and lead a club to endplay LHO as before, or lead a club immediately to endplay RHO out of his (presumed) diamond queen. You reply that 1) that would mean a nasty guess if LHO unblocked, 2) you could still go wrong if LHO began life with the doubleton queen of diamonds, and 3) drop dead, you **** well made it, didn't you?

Later, you reflect that the key to the hand (well, after you've worked out everything else, anyway) is how best to keep LHO from unblocking. That was in your mind when you led the diamond. Granted, he's unlikely to unblock no matter what, but is it best to cash the club immediately or the diamond? Well, any good player would drop the king if his remaining clubs were the king and the jack; with K1O you want himto think your clubs are Jxxx, and that your only hope was to find the doubleton King onside. And how should you do that? Cash the club immediately - playing diamonds might make him othink. And if LHO does drop the king, play him for the Jack as well, So maybe partner was right after all!

As you are going to bed, you wonder about the hand. You actually had a vibration, telling you to insert the diamond nine on the first round of the suit, which would have made it; can it ever be right? (And would it get your name into the paper?) But in your dreams, you hold LHO's hand, and are good enough to drop the King from K1O, reasoning that since declarer has a count on the hand, you will surely be endplayed if you don't. But if you do unblock, and declarer started with xxxx in clubs, he may now gowrong and try to endplay you; if he started with Jxxx he was always making — at least you've avoided the indignity of being end-played.

Unfortunately, you do not get to hold LHO's hand next morning. You do, however, once again receive the lead of the spade jack against another slam, six hearts this time, which you also must make or lose the match.

with the ace: if LHO has led away from the king, let him get his name in the paper. Now you have to pitch dummy's diamonds on your clubs. Hmm. If hearts are 3-1, clubs must be 3-3; if clubs are 4-2, hearts must be 2-2. Which is likelier. Right, the even heart split, by about 4%. But wait a minute - you can't draw them both, or you'll have no way back to your hand after ruffing a club. one round is fine, however (you might drop the jack, and now hearts are more likely to be 3-1) and expert that you are you continue with club ace-king, club,* and reap the reward of virtue when the other two hands are LHO J1092 42 Q9852 83 RHO K2 J3 AJ643 J1084

OK Why did I give you such a straightforward, easy hand? I mean, everyone would get it right - or claim to - if given it as a problem, wouldn't they? But things are different in real life.

%ed. note - if the J of trumps doesn't show in the first round, only small trumps, have you decided which trump you will use for this 'easy' club ruff? The 8, to potentially be over-ruffed with the J, or the Q, forcing you to decide later to either play for the 2-2 trump split or finesse)

At the table, declarer played hearts first and went down. And got plenty of sympathy, expecially since the other play is only a few percentage points higher. Let's be honest, now: how many of us would win the spade, draw two rounds of trumps, and look around for new worlds toconquer? In a pairs game, I'd expect +980 to be well above average, and in flight B, close to a top.

So what's the point of the hand, "think before you play?" Hardly original, and usually in 'lesson' hands you have to do it before you play to trick one. Well, that's partly it, but there's more. The hand is instructive because it shows how success at the bridge table comes by climbing one step at a time: crawling before walking before running. On this hand, after you see that you have to pitch diamonds on clubs, and then ruff a diamond, you have to know some percentages in order to decide on your strategy, your general plan. Then you need tactics: 'category - suit establishment; sub-category - only re-entry via trumps.' But you still needed the first two to get the third.

All of this you can learn from books, however. For my money, the hardest part of all is applying this knowledge in the heat of battle. Sure you need the basics first. Then fairly easy things — percentages, and plays in one suit. Then more advanced stuff — applying easier things to a hand as a whole. And good plaers learn all their lives. But in order to get anywhere, you have to overcome a bridge player's three biggest gremlins: laziness, habit, and lack of concentration. Any one of these could have made you cash two rounds of trumps first, and go down.

So what does all this have to do with getting your name in the paper? Well, play a hand like the first one, preferably in a world championship (though the late rounds of a Nationals might do in a pinch), and you'll be there for sure. Or you can take the easy way out, and write an article. But if you can overcome laziness, habit, and lack of concentration, you will be sick of seeing your name there.



THE NANAIMO SENIORS REGIONAL

There are some advantages to advancing age. One is surely the ability to play in a Seniors' Tournament. Never mind the fact that I may be prejudiced having had a tie for 1st, a 2nd and a 5/6 tie out of 4 events It was simply a fun week from beginning to end, win or lose. The hospitality was excellent and generous, the hotel ideal, and a warm, friendly attitude prevailed throughout. Chairman Amy Marks, DINO Representative George Schick and all their helpers are to be thoroughly commended.

An unusual result occurred on Saturday when Cliff and Pat Glen, who normally play together, split up for the day, and Cliff won the Flight A pairs with Don Fraser, while Pat carried me into 2ND Place. I guess a husband and wife combo have finished 1,2 before but it is the first one that I can recall. This game blew one of my pet theories down the drain. I always try to keep my alcoholic consumption to a minimum between sessions, usually allowing myself one beer, or a glass of wine. However, between sessions on Saturday, I was invited on a boat cruise with the tournament organizers, directors and other DINO officials. Needless to say, I exceeded my self-imposed limit and came back to roll a 65% game that night. So much for sobriety.

Finally, a comment on flighted events in Tournaments of this nature. There are were only 22 tables in both the Flight A Pairs and Teams, with 3 times as many in Flight B. Yet the Master Point Awards in Flight A were both generous and deep. In the Teams, half the field were in the overalls, and we got more Master Points for finishing second in the FLT A than the winners did in Flight B. yet they had to beat three times as many pairs. Of course the field is stronger but it certainly was revealing to me that any pair or team of reasonable experience should play in FLight A, where the chances of an overall placing are greatly enhanced.

WAS IT JUSTICE?

In the Flight A Teams at the Nanaimo Seniors Regional, my team consisting of Mohammed Dadbeh (my partner), George Joneson and Stan Bodlak, met the team captained by Marg Neate in the 6th round, both standing at 4 & 1 at the time. Mid-way through the match, I picked up:

S- x H- void D- A87xx

C- AKQJxxx

RHO opened 1S. I bid 2NT followed by 3D on my left. Double from partner, 3H by RHO, 5C from me, 5S from LHO, pass, pass, 6C by me, pass, pass and after some hesitation, RHO stated that maybe 3D should have been alerted. Feeling this might be critical, I

called the director immediately, and after he arrived, we were informed it might have been a splinter bid.RHO then passed, a low heart was led and dummy appeared.

S- Kx H- 10xxxx D- KJ10x C- xx

I ruffed and drew two rounds of trumps, both opponents following. I tryed a S to the K, but RHO won and I ruffed the S return. Although in retrospect perhaps, I should have played some more clubs to watch the discards, in practice I decided it was time to play

diamonds. Although clearly the bidding would indicated the RHO should be short in diamonds, I assumed that if the volunteered information was wrong, I would receive redress, so I played to the K and RHO showed out! I then conceded down one and looked to the director, who was monitoring the play, for a ruling, which I assumed would be that the misinformation would result in an adjusted score of +920. (Not vulnerable)

However, the ruling was that the board would be thrown out and we'd be awarded 3 imps. As a result of a bad result on another hand, this resulted in our losing the match by 3. At the other table, 5C was doubled, making 6, for -650, so had I made the slam we would have been +270 for 7 Imps and a 1 imp on the match. I appealed the ruling. -

Was it Justice? (cont)

We won our last two matches. Neate lost one of theirs, and at the end of the event we had tied for first place with 6 wins each. (It was a small, evenly matched field of 22 teams). Having had a good tournament, and being more than satisfied with the 25 gold points we won. I was happy enough with the result, but if the appeal was



successful, we would win outright, with 6 3/4 wins and Neate would drop 4th with $5\frac{1}{4}$. The two teams with 5 3/4 would move from a 3/4th tie to a 2/3rd tie, and primarily to protect their interests, we proceeded with the protest, but the committee threw it out, stating there was enough evidence in the bidding and the play to induce me to find the right line and both teams went home relatively happy.

My purpose in relating this incident is not sour grapes, or the intention of embarrassing anyone, but rather to point out that even under what appeared to be the most obvious of situations, you don't always get the result you expect.

In retrospect, I should have done several things. First, if the bidding was to be believed, RHO had at least 5-4 in the majors, and as 2 clubs appeared, the hand could have at most 2 Diamonds, making a splinter by LHO impossible. (LHO later stated 3D was Un v.s. Un, showing a good spade raise). Secondly, as mentioned earlier. I could have cashed some more clubs, and watched for diamond discards, if any were forthcoming, but most important I should have determined from the director before playing diamonds what the ruling would have been, as clearly the cards told me that only RHO could be short. However, I can't help but wonder if I would have got any redress, had I played normally (DA followed by the proven finesse when RHO showed out, then ruff a heart back to my hand for the 2nd finesse) and it turned out that RHO actually had 5332 which seems unlikely, but is barely possible, or had psyched the 3H bid. Of course, even if I had been advised of the ruling in advance, I still had a decision to make. Naturally, I did not know what was happening at the other table, and it would not be unreasonable to have assumed a push, so maybe 3 IMPS would have been a good deal. It is also interesting to note that a diamond lead (and ruff) would have beaten 6 clubs legitimately, but 6 D depends only on the correct Diamond play.

I guess it goes to prove that sometimes directors get tougher rulings than leads out of turn or revokes and like officials in all other sports, they are never congratulated when things go well, only criticized when one thinks he has been treated unfairly.



Regular serious competition is necessary to season local pairs and teams for top level competitions like the CNTC and CLTC. The Imp League also provides an opportunity to get to know our fellow bridge players away from the clubs and tournaments. Some teams try to play their matches at home, and socialize with their opponents before and after the match. Unfortunately, some people are not humble winners and even less gracious losers. It is easier for them to charge off boasting or sulking from a club than from someone's home. For those of us willing to make the effort to be polite when entertaining or being welcomed into someone's home, the evening can be very rewarding.

Perhaps we could restructure the League. The Flight B or Social. Teams would consist of a mixture of Life Masters and Novices and would play all their matches away from the clubs. The Flight A would be open to everyone. Their schedule could be organized like the Calgary Imp League. All the teams play on the same night every week (or every other week) at one of the clubs. The same boards could be played in all the matches. Later those interested could get together to discuss the actions and results on interesting deals; I think the Imp League can consist of tough, serious bridge in a friendly, sociable setting without any restructuring. Play your imp matches at home, or at a club. The choice is yours - but make it fun!



The concept of Bridge Network, wherein bridge players are able to advertise in the Matchpointer for a small donation (\$5) was designed to encourage our members to utilize fellow players when looking for professional services. The idea is that business people will benefit from the extra promotion and potential customers can take advantage of personal attention.

FIRST LINES IN TUDE

There are four basic areas of bridge that a player must develop in order to achieve mastery of the game - BIDDING, DECLARER PLAY, DEFENDING and ATTITUDE. All areas are of equal importance and weakness in any one will directly affect your chances for success. A good bridge player will have reached a level of competence in each of these areas. The first three are obvious, and with the help of books, lessons and experience they can be worked and improved upon. The fourth area is much more subtle and many aspiring players do not give it the attention and effort it requires.

Simply put, one can never become a great player without a reasonable attitude. With a poor attitude, partnerships, one of the cornerstones to great bridge, are impossible to create and nourish. Teams fall apart. Emotions are stressed and physical stamina is strained - both yours and those around you. As a result, events are lost. It is wonderful to be a great technician but without ATTITUDE as a strength. one is treading water in a small pond while other fish swim out to sea. Seemingly inferior players will be winning the events, playing on the stronger teams and leapfrogging past you. For the player with a positive and supportive attitude, doors open and opportunity knocks. If your attitude is poor, you cannot be counted on to bring success for yourself, your team, your partnership or your game.



I won't bore you with talk about how the game should be fun, or pleasant, or enjoyable (words which seem to have lost their meaning through repetition but are nonetheless true). The real fact is that if you have a poor ATTITUDE, you yell, criticize, harrangue, teach or grade your partner and/or your opponents at the table, you will rarely have a winning session, a winning team, or a winning game. All your bridge 'talent' will be wasted - paper skill only.

Dear Miss Goodwin

I have intended writing to you ever since your first issue hit the stands. The new Matchpointer is the greatest, in form and in substance. Assuming that, as the ACBL requires or at least requests, a copy of each issue goes to the head office, you and Dave should win a prize.

I have had more than somewhat to do with bridge publications. When the Canadian Bridge Federation was formed, I racked my brains to figure out how to get the new organization off the ground. Having observed that a great many groups managed to put together interesting newsletters, I felt that there was enough happening in Canadian Bridge to feed a newletter and concluded that we had to have one.

In the early years, however, certain people in the East got themselves into positions of power but wouldn't or couldn't bestir themselves nor move over. My toughest struggle was to get the message through to the members of the biggest Canadian unit that their leaders had feet of clay.

Eventually, those who had been dragging us down disappeared from the scene and Bob Brooks appeared. Bob had been editor of the Northern Light in Edmonton. When he moved to Vancouver we promptly appointed him editor of our Matchpointer. In 1975 we managed to get Bob appointed editor of the CBF Digest. The result was that the Digest started breathing, the CBF gained credibility and neither the Digest nor the CBF has looked back since.

I have attended a number of publications seminars put on by the editor of the ACBL Bulletin at National or NACs. It may be of interest that the pet peeve of Henry Francis and his assistants is letting a unit newletter become overloaded with bridge hands.

I am not sure if this is the sort of thing you are interested in, but of the various hats that I have worn this is the one that claimed most of my time and effort.

The following is an abbreviated version of the proposal set forth by Aidan Ballantyne, CBF President and Zone 6 Director - as presented to Unit 430 Executive in November, 1987.



TOWARDS AN INDEPENDENT CANADIAN BRIDGE LEAGUE?

Last April, the CBF Board unanimously passed a motion requesting that the ACBL examine the possibility of restructuring bridge administration in North America. In response, the ACBL struck a committee to review North American Bridge organization. Percy Bean, as a member of this committee, recently solicited opinion from DINO Canadian unit executives on the proposed reorganization.

Problems with the Status Quo

Although the present ACBL-CBF setup has brought much bridge enjoyment to Canadian players, it is characterized by a number of problems at all levels:

- *Individual The relatively high cost of ACBL membership, due to rising ACBL costs and a devalued Canadian dollar, makes it relatively difficult to sell ACBL bridge in Canada.
- *Clubs Clubs pay many of their costs in US Dollars but must set card fees that are competitive in the CAN Dollar entertainment market. The fact that Canadian clubs are sanctioned by an essentially US organization acts to dampen financial returns and discourage club investment. This, in turn, seriously impairs promotion and growth of the game north of the border.
- *Units Although Canadian units share a financial disadvantage with clubs in that they pay US \$ sanction fees for their events, units have the additional difficulty of financially supporting their CBF. Despite recent ACBL membership fee increases, the ACBL has not raised the units' revenue share and it has become progressively more difficult to meet rising CBF costs. The resulting heavy unit financial burden makes it difficult for Canadian units to implement their own local bridge-promotion programs and this, too, hurts bridge in our country.
- *Districts At this level, problems vary depending on the nature of the district. In District 19, Canadian regionals tend to be more profitable and better attended than US regionals. From the Canadian perspective, the game would be better served here if our relatively generous tournament surpluses remained in Canada to further finance local bridge programs and promotion.
- *National The CBF is not truly a national organization since it is made up of Canadian units which form part of a North American parent. This means that opportunities for federal or provincial funding and corporate sponsorship, which may be open to members of other Canadian sports and leisure organizations, are generally unavailable to Canadian bridge players.

The Canadian National Championships are sanctioned by the ACBL and thus any CBF decisions on national championships must be approved by the ACBL Board and ACBL Management. Since there is no direct administrative link between the CBF and the ACBL, this process is very time-consuming and energy-sapping.

TOWARDS AN ODEPENDENT CANADIAN BRIDGE LEAGUE (cont)

*International One advantage of international Canadian participation is that it serves to raise the profile of Canadian bridge and thereby attract new players. Canada's opportunity to compete abroad has greatly expanded in recent years. However, it has become impossible for the CBF, with its limited resources, to support this growing international effort. Government and corporate funding is a potential solution to the problem but requires formation of a true national organization. Right now we are struggling to give our representatives even rudimentary help and this is preventing successful advertising of bridge in our country.

*Multi-level problems


- 1. Administrative complexity the dual presence of the ACBL and CBF in Canada, each sponsoring its own expanding spectrum of events, is leading
- to ever greater confusion at all levels of bridge administration and this is hurting Canadian bridge.
- 2. ACBL Scale The ACBL is relatively large yet management is centralized in Memphis. This type of administration may lead to various inefficiencies and implies insensitivity to special national and regional requirements.
- 3. Effect of institutional barriers Many ACBL programs cannot easily be implemented in our country. This is inequitable given that Canadian players pay their share for the development of these programs.

Overall, the many deficiencies of the present system are combining to prevent successful growth and development of the game in Canada. The CBF has come under increasing pressure from various Canadian bridge groups to represent their interests. However, the CBF is limited in its growth capacity because it is not a true national organization, has very limited financial resources, and relies heavily on volunteer effort.

THE CBL AND THE CANADIAN PLAYER

Although a concrete blueprint for the new League does not yet exist, my own view, as a member of the CBF committee on reorganization, is that the CBL should operate according to these general principles:

- 1. Constitution
- 6 districts, each with its own elected representative
- emphasis on promotion through competition, education, published material, active ethics (much like ACBL)
- objectives a Canadian equivalent of ACBL
- financially independent relying in part on membership dues levied from individual Canadian players
- 2. CBL Programs
- Masterpoints: ACBL to continue to administer a North American Masterpoint plan. The CBL to pay ACBL for that service, on behalf of Canadian players.
- Education and Marketing: CBL to develop its own programs in Canadian form.
- Tournaments: CBL to sanction all Canadian tournaments. Directors paid as per US \$ rates. ACBL-wide tournaments (such as NAP) still available to Canadian players
- Published Material: CBL to publish its own bridge mag but Canadians may subscribe to ACBL Bulletin at an extra cost.
- Clubs: CBL to sanction and administer all Canadian clubs
- Charity Programs: CBL to continue to administer a Canadian



Overall, there would be little or no change in the actual experience of playing bridge. The real change would be in administration. Canadian tournament surpluses - always healthy - would remain in Canada. All transactions would be in Canadian money. There would be a Canadian office to coordinate government and corporate sponsorship. Administration would become more sensitive to national and regional conditions. Canadians would continue to enjoy the most popular ACBL programs as well as benefit from a well managed, efficient, national organization.

Cost and implementation

At this point I believe the new system cannot be put into place without some guarantee of official federal recognition and financial support. The CBF has already approached Sports Canada on the matter and initial response appears favourable. Ultimately, however, success may require a well-organized lobby. As a first step, more information is needed on financial feasibility and on expected CBL membership fees. This will allow Canadians to weigh the benefits and costs in deciding whether or not to proceed with reorganization. The CBF has already asked the ACBL to commission the necessary study, on behalf of its Canadian members. The CBF Board hopes that Canadians will appreciate the great potential for reorganization and at least support further research into the issue. Please make your views known to Percy! Perhaps the ACBL's apparent sluggishness is due, in part, to their need to hear from Canadian players and Aidan Ballantyne

At a recent Executive Meeting we voted to write to Percy Bean in support of outlined by Aidan, pending investigation re-organization in the manner of financial feasibility.

Unit 430

As a result of a request by the membership at the last Annual General Meeting, the Unit 430 Executive passed a motion to the effect that, for two years, all Vancouver Sectionals would be non-smoking, unless separate smoking facilities could be arranged. The Board voted to implement this policy beginning at the November 1987 Sectional. The effects of this policy are listed at right.

- 2. We will attempt to accommodate smokers in a separate room whenever possible. The limited size of certain games and the necessity of crossovers mean that some sessions will be non-smoking throughout. We hope the smokers among us will appreciate the logistic problems we face and will not hold these new facts of life against us, or against anyone.
- 3. If insufficient smokers are available to fill out a previously designated smoking section, there will not be a smoking section. Late-arriving smokers will not likely be accorded smoking privileges, and may, by their lateness, be responsible for the cancellation of smoking sections.
- 4. With sectional attendance down here as elsewhere, and with a possible loss of some of our die-hard smoking players, we will require the active support of our non-smoking majority to make this policy work, and to keep our sectionals from dwindling away. We are offering you a smoke-free bridge environment: make use of it if you want to keep it.

THE Knockouts at the Vancouver September Sectional was a small field of six teams, noticably weakened by the absence of some of our unit's strongest players. (i.e. McOrmond, Jacob, Ballantyne, Strebinger, Borg, Hagan, Connop and Brander) However, this encouraged the teams that did enter. I was on a 5 man team and played only in the second half of the final and semi-final. I was able to enjoy the luxury of healthy half-time leads in both matches and tried to avoid giving it all back. There were a few interesting deals. In the semi-final I sat between Scott Morrison and John Osborne of Victoria. Gerry McCully held my cards at the other table and Doug Baldwin held my partner, Greg Arbour's cards. On the fourth board, my partner opened 1D, Scotty passed and I held Axx xxx xx AQ10xx. Though we weren't playing 2/1 Game Force, a 2C response didn't appeal to me so I bid 1NT. LHO passed and Arbourite rebid 2D. Scotty passed again and I had to consider our prospects for a vulnerable game. I considered a 2S bid but decided on a 'prepared' pass. That is, 'prepared' to miss a game but also 'prepared' to hear a bid from LHO. Sure enough, Osborne ventured 2S which I doubled when it passed around to me. Arbour led the Ace of Hearts (A from AKx..) and dummy tabled his singleton heart and AQ10xx of Diamonds!! Fortunately Scotty also had a stiff spade.... This was the full deal:

Winning the \heartsuit A, Greg led his club tomy Q. I returned a trump Greg winning the Jack. He led a small Diamond and declarer won the stiff King. The \lozenge was led and Arbour won his K and continued Diamonds, Dummy's \lozenge winning, declarer sheddin a \heartsuit . Dummy's A of \lozenge was ruffed by my Spade Ace and a club lead promoted pard's Spade 8 for a two trick set and +500.

John Osborne had just read Grant Baze's article in the ACBL Bulletin where he said "with 6-5 come alive"; bid until the opponents double you. He did and we did. At the other table the auction was 1D, pass, 1NT, 2D*(for the majors) Pass, 2H (holding his breath), 3C from my hand, all pass. Down one. Win 12 imps.

Things continued to go well for us and toward the end of the set I held: KQ98 KQx Jxx RHO, Scotty, opened the bidding one club. I said double, LHO bid 2 pre-emptive Hearts. Partner Cue-bid 3 Hearts and Scott bid 5 Hearts. I wanted to slow things down, especially my partner, so I said double. This double was intended to show that I wasn't serious with my first double. It didn't work. Arbour bid 7 Diamonds anyway. He didn't compliment my bidding when I laid the dummy down. This was the complete deal:

A Heart was led and the Ace ruffed out to establish a good \heartsuit to pitch one small club and the 4th spade took care of the other baby club. However, even Arbour couldn't avoid the loss of a trump trick. Down one - minus 100. Pard was not happy.

At the other table, the north hand passed!! McCully opened one club, South overcalled '2H and Baldwin ventured 7 Clubs. He had to lose to both minor queens for down2 - we won 3 imps. The tide had not turned.

In the final, I was even more conscious of not bidding TOO much when this hand came along: void, AKQxxxx, AKJx, xx. We were VUL, they weren't and RHO opened 2 Spades. I had a good hand. I doubled, LHO passed and Arbour cued 3 Spades. Pass by opener. I now bid a quiet but confident 4 Hearts. Partner bid 5Clubs - "Encourage me, encourage me..." That's enough - I bid 6 Hearts, LHO led partner's suit, a spade. The whole deal was:

I won the Spade Ace, gratefully, and saw no choice but to finesse the $J\diamondsuit$, ruff a \diamondsuit and pray for 3-2 Heart break. All was well, +1430. At the other table, the auction was 2S,6H, pass pass pass. Rob Crawford led his Club Ace dropping partner's stiff K and then gave Larry a club ruff. A trump return left declarer to play Diamonds from his own hand. I guess it was our day....

MINI-McKENNEY

WHAT IS THIS GRAND NATIONAL NORTH AMERICAN SIMULTANEOUS INTER-CLUB IMP PAIRS UNIT GAME ANYHOW? (...or whatever!)

There are LOTS of different kinds of bridge events run in our unit and many of you may be confused as to exactly what they all are. Here, then, is a brief listing and description of most of them.

ACBL/CBF Events Each year, the American Contract Bridge League and the Canadian Bridge Federation hold National Championship-type games usually designed in a multi-level fashion. Players enter the event at a low level qualifying round (usually held in the local clubs) where they may or may not qualify to proceed to higher and higher levels in the event. Most of these championships start with a CLUB LEVEL qualifying game, then have a UNIT LEVEL a DISTRICT or ZONE LEVEL and finally a NATIONAL LEVEL. These events, run annually, are known to you as:

ACBL: NORTH AMERICAN NON-LIFE MASTER PAIRS (NLMP)

NORTH AMERICAN OPEN PAIRS (NAOPC) formerly Grand National Pairs

CBF: CANADIAN WOMENS TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS (CWTC)

CANADIAN NATIONAL TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS (CNTC)

AIR CANADA OPEN PAIRS CHAMPIONSHIPS formerly Canadian Open Pairs Champ

UNIT 430 Sectional Tournaments- we run 5 of these tournaments each year:

JAN-FEB Vancouver Winter Sectional

JUNE B.C.Championships Sectional

SEPTEMBER Evergreen Sectional

OCTOBER Future Stars Sectional (0-100 Master Points only)

NOVEMBER Round-Up Sectional

Unit Games - Unit games are kind of like mini-tournaments with higher point awards than clubs. They are designed to be open to all unit members and we are able to hold a large variety of game types. In the past Unit Games were very popular but over the last 2 or 3 years attendance has been way down. As a result of this, the unit was losing money and had to cut back on the number of Unit games per year. We still have our yearly stand-bys which are:

JULY Annual General Meeting and Unit Game

This is the time for all members to participate in major decision making and meet the Unit Executive.

FALL Inter-Club Championships

Unit 430 clubs each put together a team, based on certain requirements (i.e. no more than 2 LMs, one novice, etc) and the club teams play for the Inter-Club Championship. Some clubs have playoffs in order to pick a team or teams for this event.

FALL Inter-City Championship

This is an old, but popular, event which has recently been re-activated. The game is run as an IMP PAIRS event, with the top 5 pairs from each of two flights (FLT.B Non-LM) forming Vancouver Teams and Challenging Seattle Teams in a two-day final.

WINTER CHRISTMAS GAME This is the Unit's Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to all its members. It is really a party, with some bridge thrown in. Cash Bar. Food. Lots of Fun

OTHER Other Unit Games may be held throughout a year and are always advertised in the Matchpointer.

UNIT FINALS Whenever you see this, refer to the above ACBL/CBF article.



CLUBS

Clubs, too, may hold special events other than their regular club nights. Some of these events pay higher Master Pt. awards. Some clubs have special Annual Trophy events. Some to watch for are:L CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS MEMBERSHIP GAMES HANDICAP GAMES CHARITY GAMES CLUB-LEVEL QUALIFYING ROUNDS (see ACBL/CBF)

OTHER SPECIAL EVENTS

EPSON WORLD-WIDE BRIDGE CONTEST This highly enjoyable event is held every year in late spring or early summer. When you play, you are competing against players from all over the world, ALL PLAYING AT THE SAME TIME! Some are playing in their morning, some their afternoon, some late evening. The scoring is set up so that you know as soon as you finish the hand what your matchpoint award is. At the end of the game, you receive a special booklet with hand analyses and other good stuff. If you do very well, you become famous. Master point awards are equal to those earned at a sectional and are part red. Sometimes this event is held at a variety of clubs. In 1988 The EPSON PAIRS will be held at the JUNE SECTIONAL 11:00 AM at the UBC SUB Ballroom. Watch for details.

ACBL-WIDE (CONTINENT-WIDE) CHARITY GAMES Sometimes held in the clubs, sometimes run as a Unit Game, this event occurs twice a year. The point awards are equal to that of a sectional and although everyone is not playing at the same time, people from across the NA Continent are playing the same day. A percentage of proceeds go to ACBL CHarities so the table fees must be higher. Often, hand analyses sheets are available at the end of the game.

**Note on the above two events - everyone will be playing the SAME HANDS.

I hope this has helped clear up some muddy waters. Watch for details of all these events in your MATCHPOINTER!

LAST CHANCE TO QUALIFY!!!



In practice, the Vancouver South led a diamond so the other side made 7 doubled, for -850! The other table was +450 for your side so if you underlead the Ace you earn +300 to win 12 IMPS instead of losing 9 IMPS? a 21 IMP swing!

You must get partner to cash the other high heart and hope to score your diamond King. The best approach is to encourage with theJ, so partner will play you for a doubleton. If you play the 2, partner may visualize declarer as having something like:

In that case it is imperative to switch to a club before the $Q \heartsuit$ is set up for a club discard. In practice, the Vancouver South played the Heart 2 and the club shift yielded -400. This lost 6 IMPS when your team mates made +150 in a diamond partscore. A high heart brings +5 IMPS, an 11 IMP

Thus, if you solved all the problems, you gained 54 imps to easily win the match. Better try out for the team next year!!




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
