AN EDITORIAL

How many times have you heard: "But we've been through this auction a MILLION Times! How could you make that mistake!?"

Its a stinger, and makes one feel awful. You begin to doubt your own mind, your ability and intelligence. How COULD you have been so stupid?

One of the biggest reasons for error at the table is the incorrect or incomplete understanding of a basic lesson. The student interprets the lesson and, because his understanding works for most situations, he does not realize that he is missing an important point. Basic errors are compounded because, when involved in the learning process, the student makes every effort to 'do what is right'. It is hard, at first, to generalize - to link all the learned pieces together to create a whole understanding. The student is trying hard to be 'good' and relys heavily on notes, study and maxims. An incorrectly worded rule or an incomplete maxim can cause many problems later in one's bridge life especially if everyone, the student included, assumes he understands. Bridge is a fluid game where tiny changes in hand pattern or bidding create countless variations. No auction or hand is ever the same. If a lesson is not understood properly, sooner or later a situation will arise where the student is at a loss. The thing to do at these times is, rather than hang your head and bemoan your stupidity, ask:

"Wait a minute - is there something basic I am missing here?"

Try and find out why you should know better or what it is you should know! Remember the hand and the auction, write it down if you have to and go over it later with partner. Or ask a better player about it. Better yet, ask a couple of players. Try to get a complete understanding and weed out your misconceptions. You may very well find out that the 'standard american' you learned in your early days is now quite different. You may find that basics you once learned are no longer carved in stone but rather, vary from player to player. Or you may find that you just didn't fully learn the original 'lesson'. Give yourself a break this year- trust in your ability to play and learn the game and start to research the reasons behind your errors.


MATCHPOINTER NEWS

RE: December Matchpointer, Intercity Match Quiz Problem #4

I believe it is difficult to fault the Vancouver South for not defeating Seattle's somewhat ambitious 5D contract. Here's why:

If South plays Heart Jack and then 7 or 2, North will probably try for the ruff. When South follows to the third round, declarer should start asking himself questions. Why was South so eager for North to cash the Heart King? South can't be counting on his side to take a spade or a club, so he must hold the Diamond King! If doubleton, it will always win, so declarer is forced to invoke the Rabbi's Rule and play for the drop! I'd contend that South's misleading play of the hearts should be made when he doesn't hold the diamond King! If declarer doesn't hold it he will probably be talked into playing for the drop. Bluff and double bluff!

Despite repetitive pleas in the Bulletin over the last 20 years for courteous behavior, I find that many players still care little about acting in a civilized manner. At the recent Regional I noted that some 'professionals' insist on berating and belittling their clients while their opponents are still at the table. In my opinion, when a client is paying for the experience and is prepared to put up with the pro's behavior, that is their business. However, I'd insist and prefer they do it elsewhere. Now that we have non-smoking sections, perhaps it is time to set up an S&M section for those who can't do without a little abuse! Stan Bodlak

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF DINO

However measured, I feel most would agree the recently concluded Vancouver Regional was most successful. This was largely due to the great support given it by you, the members of Unit 430.

You may be interested in knowing that I surveyed all the entries and discovered the following:

50% Unit 430 !

14% Vancouver Island (55%: Victoria 45%: North Island)

9% B.C.Interior (50% North BC, 33% Okanagan, Rest-Kootenays)

17% Washington State

4% Alberta

2% Other Canada (mostly Sask. & Man some Ont)

4% Other US (Many of these were touring pros and their clients. Of the rest, most were from California. Some from OR. None from the US portion of District 18)

Thus: 50% LOCAL 73% BC 79% CANADIAN 90% DISTRICT 19

Unfortunately, because of costs, we are locked into January dates, which will always preclude a lot of visitors from far afield. If this regional is to remain viable, it will have to continue to depend on primarily local support.

I did note one disturbing factor. 40% of the entries were Life Masters (46% if you exclude events for which they weren't eligible). As only 20% of the ACBL as a whole, and 25% of Unit 430 are Life Masters, it appears as though our less experienced players did not support the tournament as well as they might have, despite there being many events scheduled expressly for them. This is something to think about for the future.



The next Vancouver Regional will be held at the Hyatt, Jan 15-21, 1990. Meanwhile, we hope to see you at Tacoma and Spokane later this year - and Victoria, Seattle, & Tri-Cities in 1989. If you are old enough, our Seniors Regional this year will be in Yakima in August and in 1989, in the Okanagan (either Penticton or Vernon) in June.

In conclusion, I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge the fine efforts of co-chairmen Tom Cross and Louis Landau and all their assistants - and of course, Phil Wood, Roger Putnam and their fine crew who never fail to run tournaments of the highest quality.

My thanks again to everyone for a very successful tournament.

NORTH AMERICAN OPEN PAIRS FLIGHT B

For the second year in a row, District 19 will be represented in the North American Open Pairs Flight B by a Vancouver pair. Last year Peter Hupka and Rick Baker won a trip to St.Louis. This year, we wish all the best to EUGENE CHAN and NIGEL FULLBROOK as they shuffle off to Buffalo.

Nigel's quiet, easygoing manner is a startling contrast to his reputation as a fierce and aggressive chess player. Nigel has been Canadian Junior Chess Champion and BC Champion. He still plays regularly and is one of the top ranked BC Players.

Eugene is one of our more pleasant and cheerful members. He started playing bridge while at UBC and decided to try his first duplicate game when he read that the Spring Nationals were being played in Vancouver. He filled out a convention card for the first time and entered the least intimidating looking event - the side game. He decided to hang around for his score and found he had a section top with a 203 (156 av). There were three 15 table sections in the side game and Eugene was THIRD overall. Barry Crane tied for 1ST OA with a 203-. (Eugene tells me it was 13 years before he had his next 200 point game)

Over the next few years Eugene played in a few Unit Games but he avoided the bridge clubs because he thought those games were full of experts and hot-shots. Due to lack of partners and encouraging results, he drifted away from bridge. Three years ago, a guy at work said the magic words: 'Do you play bridge?'. Eugene re-entered the bridge world and met Nigel. They formed a partnership and entered a team in the B FLT Imp League for the 85-86 season. Despite missing the playoffs, they decided to move up to the A FLT the next year. They feel that Imp League matches against the Unit's top players have been very beneficial to their game .

Eugene has over 100 masterpoints now, and has come a long way from that day in 1985 when he played with Paul Sontag in his first Swiss Team event. Eugene passed his partner's Takeout Double three times on one hand that day! .

Eugene and Nigel played solidly in the District Final in Seattle and led from wire to wire. We hope that their composure, friendly manner and good luck will lead them to success in Buffalo.

Enter, once again, the Unit Game. Here is our chance. We will run special Unit Games and give our members the opportunity to play the more unusual events.



REGIONAL RAP

The recent Vancouver Regional was quite a success with many of our members gathering in the top spots. Unit 430 players won 10 firsts and 9 seconds out of the 17 main events with many more top five placings.

The star of the Regional Events was DAVID WATERMAN, who won FIRST OVERALL in the MEN'S PAIR, FIRST OVERALL in the FLIGHT A KNOCK OUTS, and SECOND OVERALL, after a huge evening session, in the FLIGHT A MASTERS PAIRS! Those three events alone earned him about 89 master points. Anotherlocal hero was GREG ARBOUR, who also won FIRST OVERALL in the FLIGHT A KNOCKOUTS, playing on David's team, snapped at David's heel in the MENS PAIRS, winning SECOND OVERALL, and came home with a 6TH OVERALL in the OPEN PAIRS. LARRY HICKS had a good tournament, placing SECOND OVERALL in the FLIGHT A KNOCKOUTS, and, partnered with DAVE GLEN, taking 1ST OVERALL in the OPEN PAIRS.

79 tables entered the NEWCOMER and JUNIOR arena over the week and as someone who's office was just offtheir game site, I can assure you there was lots of fun and excitement. For many of these people, this was their first regional. The winners list is a varied collection of local players but we do have double winners ANN & ART SCHMIDT of North Vancouver, who took two FIRST OVERALLS. JOAN and L.DEAR also did well with a 3rd and a 2nd OVERALL.

Champion of the side games was unquestionably HENRY SMILIE (partnered twice by Thony Stiennon of Burnaby) who came FIRST in 3 events, including the one named after himself! Cam Doner cleaned up in the MIDNICHT SWISS category and on January 10th could probably claim that he had won every Midnight Swiss this year!

The highest score of the regional, on a 156 average, was 242.3... Boggles the mind doesn't it? The second highest score could be found twice - 226.5 - won by STAN BODLAK in the Senior Pairs, and David Waterman and STEVE VINCENT in the Masters Pairs. Third highest score - 221.5 - was won by BRENDA ROBSON and ALISON DOROSH on their way to FIRST OVERALL in the FLIGHT B MASTER PAIRS.

TO DRURY OR NOT TO DRURY?

Here's an interesting hand from a recent club team game. No one vul, as dealer you hold :

With the opponents silent, you pass, and pard opens 1S in third seat. We're playing REVERSE DRURY (2C from you asks pard if he has a "legitimate" third or fourth seat opener; a 2D response from him says "yes I do"; any other response is natural but also says "no I don't").

So the first thing to consider is: IS THIS THE RIGHT TYPE OF HAND FOR DRURY? Drury is designed to a) show a decent limit raise and yet b) keep the partnership out of game if opener is subminimum. You don't want to hang pard if he's scratched up a third or fourth seat call to protect your (possible) near-opener. BUT, I ASK YOU AGAIN, IS THIS THE RIGHT HAND FOR DRURY? Let's consider some possibilities:

- (1) An argument could be presented that it's not good enough, even though the hand values to at least 10 pts in support of spades. Ergo, perhaps we should just bid 25 ?
- (2) On the other hand, another argument could be made that it's too good (1) because of the extra trumps and ruffing value.
- (3) A THIRD POINT TO CONSIDER IS THAT YOU DONT WANT LHO
 SLIPPING IN A CHEAP TWO-LEVEL CALL, WHICH SHE CAN DO OVER 2C.
 SO, how about an immediate 3S CALL? This is supposed to show a super limit raise (remembering that you have passed the first time) which you're going to justify by (2) above!

3S should have two effects: a) stop the opponents bidding and b) if pard's hand is that bad - or (horrors!) he's psyched! - he'll pass quickly and the opponents must be on for something, apart from the fact that they may not double (we ARE playing IMPS, remember - and should be very careful about doubling part scores).

The rest of the story: I elected (3) and my 3S call fetched 4H from pard! Which your correspondent took as a cue bid asking me to bid my cheapest ace, so I obediently bid 5H and pard jumped to 6S. (No fancy stuff, and whoever heard of Blackwood anyway ?!?)

Pard's hand happened to be:

Magic cards ... the slam was not found at the other table.

Hopefully we would have found it if I had invoked brury, but only through a much longer and more involved auction, and since old Mother Nature here tends to nod off in such situations, the short and sweet auction turned out to be best.

CONCLUSION? We should reserve Drury for the flatter hands with more HCP - where the opponents are not so likely to step in; and keep the single or double raise for the more shapely hands with fewer HCP.

The Question:

What do you Lead?

This hand, played in the recent Seattle Sectional Swiss Teams, revived the old debate as to whether or not it is always right to lead 'fourth best from your longest and strongest' v.s. 3NT.

The Case For: At one table, I was sitting West and on the auction shown at left, led the J of Clubs, hoping to find partner's suit. This was not a great success. Partner rolled her eyes at another of my 'views' while the opponents quickly chalked up 12 tricks. Obriously a clear case for following the old maxim.

The Case Against: At the other table, our teammates also reached 3NT, this time from the other side (after a forcing NT). Luckily for us, the oldtimer in the East seat was a firm believer in the familiar adage, and he tabled the 2 of spades. Our declarer floated this to his J and also soon claimed 12 tricks - a push!

As you can see, the debate on the merits of leading 'Fourth best from your longest and strongest' is still unresolved...

OVERHEARD AT THE VANCOUVER REGIONAL:

1NT on my right, 2H from me, 2NT by LHO, pass by partner, 3NY by RHO, all pass.

LHO tables dummy and asks "Aren't we playing Lebensohl, partner?"

"Oh, yes, but NOT IN COMPETITION!"



WEEDING OUT THE MISUNDERSTANDINGS by Jude Goodwin.

In light of my editorial (page one) on errors at the bridge table, the Matchpointer will be running a series of articles on systems, conventions and treatments as played by local experts. These articles are geared toward the newer players but may be found informative by all. Before I let the experts take over, however, I would like to discuss a couple of things which I have had to learn the hard way - through error! Hopefully with this discussion, you'll escape the same experience. A short treatise, then, on FORCING BIDS.

- 1.A) A FORCING BID by partner means you MUST BID
 You have all learned this lesson, I am sure. However, the above
 statement is not enough. There will arise, sooner or later, situations where things are not so clear. A more accurate wording
 would be:
- B) A FORCING BID PARTNER MEANS YOU MUST MAKE SURE HE GETS TO BID AGAIN
 In other words, if there is a PASS on your right, you had better bid,
 or the auction may die before partner gets to bid again. However,
 if there is a BID on your right, you can now choose to bid or pass,
 knowing partner gets another bid, either way.

There is an important corollory to statement B) above, which you may not have considered:

C) IF PARTNER EXPECTS YOU TO BID AGAIN . YOU MAY NOT PASS!

When you have made a forcing call, asking partner to make sure you get another chance to bid, partner has the freedom to bid whatever he sees fit, secure in the knowledge that you are going to bid again! Responses to these forcing bids are something you and partner will need to discuss. A new suit by him, after your forcing call, may not necessarily show extras. A rebid of his original suit may not necessarily be showing weakness. He knows you are going to bid again, so he is taking the opportunity to describe his hand for you.

N E S W 1H 1S 2S P 3H P ? If you and your partner play that 2S is forcing, and promises another bid, you cannot PASS here.

Partner is not necessarily limiting

his hand with 3H. He is making a flexible call based on the knowledge that you are going to bid again. Of course, if partner should jump to game in this, or any other forcing auction, you are not obligated to bid again. HOWEVER, if the opponents decide to enter your auction, partner can PASS happily, knowing you will take another call (either bid or double) because or your original promise.

- 2.A) IF RESPONDER RESPONDS IN A NEW SUIT IT IS FORCING. This is a clear and well understood maxim. However, a more complete understanding must include:
 - B) WHEN YOU OPEN THE HAND, YOU GUARANTEE ANOTHER BID unless responder limits his hand. Both A and B create similar results, but B goes a lot further in explaining a generalized approach. When you open a hand, responder makes his bid secure in the knowledge that opener is going to bid again unless responder has limited his hand with a free pass or limit bid. Understanding this will help you develop a greater understanding of why it is a good idea to have a rebid when opening questionable hands!

I will leave most applications of these principles to the experts to explain, theorize and discuss, but I would like to touch on one sensitive area that MUST be discussed with partner.

WHEN YOU RESPOND ON THE 2-LEVEL ARE YOU PROMISING ANOTHER BID?

I am not discussing 2/1 Game Force here - just Standard American. Let's look at this simple auction:

as long as responder has not limited his hand. However, because responder has not guaranteed another bid, opener strives to LIMIT his hand to better aid responder in determining the proper contract. Opener is aware that responder may pass at his next turn.

BUT!!! If you and partner play that a 2-level responses PROMISES ANOTHER CALL, responder may not pass in the above auction. Opener is now bidding 2 Spades secure in the knowledge that he will be getting another turn to bid. He is relying on two chances to describe his hand and his call may be part one of a two part description. Auctions arising from playing this more modern approach to 2-level responses must be discussed between you and your partner.

One of the problems with a true understanding of bridge is the word STANDARD. So many players assume THEY are playing standard, when in fact, their approach doesn't mesh with that of their partners'. I played for 6 months, after my move to Vancouver, within a partnership where everything ran quite smoothly. Then one day, the above auction came up and everything fell apart. He was firious at me when I elected to pass 2S. Maybe we missed a slam, I don't recall. I just sat there looking at him like he was from another planet — at the same time wondering if maybe I was! I thought he was limiting his hand and he thought I was promising another bid. And so it goes.....

We hope that, with a series of articles on bidding and systems, we will be helping to weed out these kinds of misunderstandings. I am very tired of hearing "BUT IT'S JUST STANDARD! Everyone knows that...". How about You?




