How many of us shared beer and conversation with him at the Devonshire and Jolly Alderman? He was always laughing over something that had happened at the bridge table.

If there is an afterlife I'll expect to hear a familiar voice saying, "Dimich, I've got a few hands for you."

His health problems were obvious and increasingly intruded into his life, yet they were not allowed to dominate it. Indeed, living each day was a triumph

Don carried over his traits to the bridge table. I never heard him utter an angry word to any of his partners, only an occasional mild request - his finger scratching his temple - to explain an enigmatic bid or play. He was eager to play, enjoyed discussing hands and listening to good bridge stories almost endlessly. As a matter of fact, the last time I spoke to Don he had dropped into the club late on a TGIF night for a beer and some bridge conviviality. After decades he still maintained an avid interest in the game which most lose in their first years. Don's fraternity with us is a shining reflection on bridge players everywhere and our great game, bridge.

Yes. he was different.

In the last issue of the Matchpointer, we discussed the different areas of UNIT involvement in organized bridge in the Lower Mainland. Perhaps the largest and most time-consuming effort is the planning of Sectional Tournaments. Currently, we have a very capable pair of Tournament Chairpersons: Steve Beaton and Louis Landau. At each Unit Meeting, a good deal of time is taken up discussing up-coming sectionals, sectional schedules, sectional sites and sectional ideas. To this point we have instituted the following:

HOSPITALITY: It is our goal to provide the players with as much hospitality as possible. At some sectionals we are able to have unit members bring home-baked goodies which, I am sure, are greatly enjoyed. However, the Sheraton Landmark, site of the January and November tournaments, will not allow any food served that is not catered by the hotel. The costs of this catering are high. Another step toward hospitality has been FREE COFFEE, with catered baked goods as well Sunday Mornings. There are other forms of hospitality provided as well - boxes of chocolates as door prizes at the Valentine Sectional, Wine and Cheese Party at the B.C.Championships - and we continute to plan in this area, at the same time keeping within our budgets.

SCHEDULES: Over the last year, Steve has come up with a 3-year schedule, including dates, sites and events. This effort on his part will greatly

help in planning and organization.

SITES: Always an issue, the Executive has made every effort to find suitable sites. There are a lot of needs to satisfy, the principles being: Travel, Parking, Costs, Space and surroundings. Currently, our sectionals are booked in at three sites, each one satisfying some people and not others.

TROPHIES: We have our major trophy events (Adrian & June Budd Hicks Trophy, Willie Weinstein Trophy, Ben Lapidus Trophy, Henry Smilie Commemorative Trophy) and as well, we have instituted a variety of Junior games, each with a trophy.

JUNIOR EVENTS: Single session Junior Events were added to our regular schedules at the April 1988 Board meeting. We hope that all our players within the specified point ranges will support these new events with their attendance. At the Evergreen Sectional, attendance was low but don't let this discourage you! Hopefully attendance will grow as people get used to the idea...

TABLE FEES: Our table fees have been increased slightly to:
\$6 per person for regular events and \$5 per person for Junior events.

These increases have helped decrease our overall tournament losses.

The method of chosing was an IMP pairs event held at the Haida. 20 Flight A pairs showed up, with intent to represent their city. However ONLY 4 Flight B pairs were interested in competing for a berth on the Vancouver Team. When 71% of our unit are non-LM. it seems strange that we could only get 8 of them to participate in this traditional event. Perhaps our Flight Bs didn't realize there was a free dinner (w/drinks) on the line! Surely if they weren't interested in the competition they may have shown up for a free meal ticket. However - we do have two teams ready to go and the BIG EVENT will be happening at the Pemberton this October 22&23rd.

Club owners and managers are now receiving Conditions of Contest for the NAT-B. (PLEASE NOTE- since the advent of the Canadian National Team Championships, there is NO N.American Teams - Flight A in Canada). The NAT -B is another multi-level event where players qualify first at the clubs. All ACBL members must be allowed to play. NON MEMBERS WELCOME at the club level. Players qualify as INDIVIDUALS, then form their permanent teams for the Unit Level. This event is restricted to NON LIFE MASTERS as of September 30, 1988. Point awards:



Play has now, hopefully, begun for Flights A and B, with the season opener to be completed by Oct.22 for A and Oct.19 for B. We have included a condensed version of the schedules at left so KEEP THIS ISSUE. A rundown of the A teams has been prepared by a member of last year's winning team. We already know he can play bridge but can he handicap?

THERE WILL BE A FLIGHT C if enough of you are interested. Register on the Sunday of the Future Stars Sectional (October 16) or phone Dawn Kingsland (926-9025) or Pauline McClafferty (873-0908) by October 23. We can help you get on a team. The entry fee for flight C will be \$16 per team for the year.

In FLIGHT A the four top finishers qualify for the playoffs, as usual, but the overall winners will pick their opponent for the semi-finals from the other three teams.

In FLIGHT B things are a bit more complicated. Three teams will qualify for the playoffs. Teams will play each other twice. The year is split into two parts. Winner of the first half (to Dec.31) goes to the semi-final. The second half ends March 31 and winner of that half goes to the semi-final. The overall winner for the whole year gets a 'bye' for the semi-finals and plays the winner of the semi-final for title, trophy, glory and etc. In case there is duplication above, second and third overall finishers will play the semi-final.



AN INSIDER'S LOOK AT THE IMP LEAGUE -FLIGHT A by Mae Thorp

LINE 2-1 DIVINSKY, Nathan (Aidan Ballantyne, Don Brazeau, Dan Jacob, Gord McOrmond, Michael Strebinger)

Last season's Divinsky entry stumbled through a so-so season until, with their intrepid leader in Europe, they went quietly in the first playoff round. This did not sit well with Bossman Nate who, if he can't buy a championship, can at least pretend to. Gone are Journeymen Hicks and Dimich, replaced by the star tandem of Jacob and McOrmond. Initially the Lindsay team attempted to claim Strebinger in exchange for Jacob, but irregularities in Jacob's contract allowed him to become a free agent without compensation - the sort of break which might afford a G.M. a lifetime contract in other sports pursuits.

PROS Best foursome in the League, backed up capably by 'Lucky Charm' Brazeau and Renaissance Man Divinsky.

CONS McOrmond will have to actually play." Ceremonial totems may cut it against evil spirits but the IMP League is a highly tangible entity As well, wherein dwell big talents, there also lurk big egos. Will there be enough glory to go around?

LINE 7-2 TAKEMORI, Michievelli (John Bryden, Dennis Dohl, Martin O'Really, Ben Takemori, Steve Vincent)

Holy Team Harmony, Batman - in the fractious world of top level Unit 430 Bridge, last year's 'A' League champs will field the same six players for the third consecutive year. Does this represent misplaced confidence, apathy, or is there a conspiracy against the signing of free agents?

PROS Dohl, fresh from interviews on the picket line, will be his usual voluable self as team spokesman. Ben T., once again spent his summer handling vegetables (thus should be able to handle his partners) and Puppet-master Mike T. will have the customary myriad line-ups to juggle.

CONS Bryden, eschewing the usual summer bridge conditioning program, tested dangerously high for brain fat at the recent Inter-City Trials and was quickly placed on a day-dream free diet. O'Really, usually deadly with the two-way finesse, will have trouble locating those missing queens with his broken big toe throbbing ALL the time and 'Steady Eddy' Vincent, the team glue, may be unavailable for key matches due to mysterious 'business' trips. (Bookies please note)

LINE 4-1 LINDSAY, Cam (Ron Borg, Bob Connop, Paul Hagen)

It seemed like the same old story. They spit the bit at the break and fell way behind the pace-setters. But picked it up late in the season and snuck into the playoffs ahead of a team which collapsed at the wire. They won their semifinal match, led at the half in the final and ... LOST ??? That wasn't in the script! CUT! And cut they did. Gone is the high-fallutin' European jockey and his electric whip. Getting back to basics, the League's only four-bagger is a lean, mean machine (well, Lindsay is not so lean).

PROS When these guys are on a roll, they are as tough as they come around here.

- CONS Do we detect a faint heart murmur? When one team member is heard extolling the virtues of snowshoe golf and another is seen pricing tennis parkas, it do make a body wonder. If they toss snake-eyes off the bat like last season, Amelia Earhart may have some company down there in Atlantis.
- LINE 6-1 CHRISTIE, Marcia (Richard Christie, Gerry McCully, Debbie McCully, Doug Baldwin, Jim McCully)

A mild surprise last year, this sextet topped the round robin portion of the season before bowing out in the semi-finals.

- PROS Uniformity of opposition; anyone who isn't a McCully is likely an honorary McCully. No window dressing; all of these people can play. Gerry Mac and Baldwin appear to be back on track given their Inter-City Trials win (mind you, there was money on the line in that event). Jim Mac, bridge-broken in recent years, is now more dangerous to the enemy than to his own team.
- CONS Marital partnerships should, but probably won't, be avoided. Will the pernicious influence of the prehistoric rubber game prove detrimental? Will Jim remember to go on the paper?
- LINE 8-1 HOUSE, Dave (Greg Arbour, Adrian Hicks, Anne Nagy, Elliott Netto, Paul Sontag)

Last season the House team blazed to perhaps the best start in League history. They appeared destined to set a record for round-robin performance when the wheels fell off. After fan support was slow to materialize, their promoter fled back to tinsel-town leaving G.M. House holding an empty bag. Their two star players succumbed to the lure of the tournament trail where paycheques, albeit irregular, were backed by more than good will. Though the legions of replacement players did their darndest, it was a dispirited and confused flock of bridge-hawks who flapped and fluttered their way to the finish line. Eternal optimist House and several loyal (they'll even work for nothing) retainers have assembled a squad which will at least finish the season, rather than vice-versa.

- PROS The acquisition of Arbour has to help. All of last year's holdovers have had experience (and experiences) partnering him. Nobody enjoys winning more than Nagy or has won more than Hicks.
- CONS Hicks, somewhere past ultra-violet on the bridge bidding spectrum, may have trouble relating to a team to which 'Bridge World' is the equivalent of 'Readers' Digest'. Hard feelings may arise from time to time as well, because this team is by far the most vociferous in the league. (House is the one with his eyes closed, his teeth clenched and his hands over his ears).
- LINE 12-1 JOHNSON, Martin (Chris Christoffersen, Jean Groome, Mike Rahtjen, Peter Walton, Derek Ward)

Last year's Remedious entry (from which Remedios wisely withdrew prior to the first match) suffered through an embarrassingly abysmal season, Occupying the cellar much of the way before regrouping somewhat near the end. Those members still on speaking terms are back with an augmented line-up which should contend for the playoffs.

PROS Former CNTC semi-finalists Johnson and Christoffersen have had substantial past success. Ward is solid and can play with Groome. Knuckleballer Rahtjen, another in the long line of Prairie Boys, who seem bred to pitch, may help Walton jazz up the slow curve his opponents have dubbed 'Harvest Moon'.

- CONS The tendancy to post-mortem hands before they've cooled (occasionally before they've even expired), may upset more squeamish team members; and speaking of knuckleballs, did anyone remember the butterfly net?
- LINE 18-1 DICKIE, Sheila (Sandra Borg, Connie Delisle, Jennifer Paynter, Rhoda Tafler)

The previous Dickie incarnation played evenly throughout the schedule and finished repectably, within sight of the playoffs. Will respectable be enough to do the trick this year?

- PROS Borg rewrites the book of tactical bids and opening leads every time out (although the addition of a Kwan or Kinakin to keep her company on those long lonely orbits wouldn't hurt). Dickey and Delisle are to grinders as diamond drills are to thumbtacks.
- CONS Fatique. Fatigue. Fatigue. Team management might consider cots and blankets for the half-time break (which can be quite lengthy on any given night for the table most prone to the problem). The VPs which get snoozed away will probably prove the difference between the playoffs and an early trip to the golf course.
- LINE 25-1 McILWAIN, Sandy (Rhonda Betts, Leslie Gold, Jude Hanson, Julie Smith, Roberta Miller-Tait)

Take a playoff-bound team derailed by an also-ran in its' final match last year, subtract its' best player and add a player new to the League and what do you get?

PROS Well, for one thing, a more relaxed team. There are some accomplished multiple tournament winners present but this doesn't seem to be a squad that would play its' best under excessive self-scrutiny.

- CONS Too many players still feeling their way at this level to be a consistant threat. Patience will be required (as well as four bodies per road trip).
- LINE 30-1 McMULLIN, Gray (Chris Diamond, Dennis McMahon, John Reay, Bill Terzianoff, Duane Tilden)

Several of these guys are a bit long in the tooth and none have been known to consume garlic sandwiches but they are still the closest thing in the League to Young Turks and must accordingly be put in their place - namely, near the bottom.

- PROS This assessment will, no doubt, get them good and mad and cause them to play inspired bridge.
- CONS McMahon and Reay are a quiet pair who seem to know what they're doing. Diamond and Tilden are a not-so-quiet (in the bar, at least) pair who seem to know what they're doing three seconds after it's been done. McMullin and the Mini-Hulkster, an unlikely partnership, will probably cut in and out of the line-up with a variety of players, as good rubber players should. How the latter two perform with the rest holds the key to the team's fortunes (Ottawa-style airlifts having fallen out of fashion).
- LINE 80-1 CHIARENZA, Marguerite (Catriona Brown, Nigel Fullbrook, Pauline McClafferty, Larry Pocock, June Stenning)

Well, somebody has to start the season down here and that distinction usually falls on the team of odds and ends. No law, however, says they have to finish where they started.

- PROS Pocock and Stenning are an ambitious partnership and may surprise a few people. Brown has been successful in past 'B'Leagues and should provide backbone. Fullbrook has found the transition from the free-wheeling world of chess to the more rigorous, disciplined world of bridge tougher than expected, but appears to have the idea now and will be an asset if he plays.
- CONS Unfortunately, every IMP League has a mandatory Blitz (i.e. a team which any opponent with playoff aspirations feels they have to wale on) and this would appear to be them. It ain't fair when everyone is trying to make you an eleventh place team in a ten team league but it is a lot of fun, too, when the win, let alone the Blitz, fails to materialize, and said opponents leave the room shaking their heads and casting about for next year's new teammates.

BIDDING PROBLEMS FOR JUNIORS by Liz Hicks

* * * WHO'S THE BOSS? * * *



You are playing IMPs with a reasonably 'Good Player' (whatever that means!) and you pick up:

S- xx H- Kx Opponents are vulnerable, we are not, partner is the dealer. The auction proceeds:

D- A 10xx C- KJ10xx

Partner RHO YOU L
P 1S 2NT*
3D 3S P
4D 4H 7

* Unusual No Trump asking partner to bid a minor. (Not everyone may agree with this call because it

does suggest 5-5 but this was the call you chose to make)

OK, Students, what is your call?

Questions you should be asking yourself might include:

- 1. Why has RHO bid the way she has (vulnerable yet!)
- 2. Why has partner made another call which has pushed the opponents
- to the game level? Why didn't he pass?
- 3. Should you now compete to 5D?

Answers: 1.RHO is suggesting 6 spades and 4 hearts and a GOOD hand

- 2.Good question! Remember partner's 3D call was 'forced' so why has he reopened the auction and given RHO a chance to bid again? YOU MUST TRUST HIM TO HAVE A GOOD REASON. He must be prepared to
 - a) play 4D (possible doubled); therefore he must have some offensive values because he knows you could have a much weaker hand (but then it should be more distributional)
- OR b) defend the opponents if they bid again (possible doubled)
- 3. NO!!! You should NOT bid 5D for two good reasons:
 - a) If you bid 5D, you are bidding your hand twice
 - b) Partner cannot want to play game, or he would have jumped cue-bid at his first opportunity. HE IS NOW THE BOSS Again you must trust him and pass quietly.

CONCLUSION: When you have made a defensive bid such as a weak two-bid, weak jump overcall, Michaels or Unusual NT, you must allow partner to control the situation and NOT BID AGAIN UNLESS he forces you. Don't try to second-guess.


The SAME THEORY applies when you open 1NT (weak, strong or otherwise). AGAIN, LET PARTNER BE THE BOSS. You have told your story. He knows what you have got and should be able to place the contract correctly (or else I suggest you find yourself another parther!).

MATCHPOINT MYTHS part one by Jude Hanson

SHOULD WE BID LOW PERCENTAGE GAMES?

I am sure that you have often heard "It's Matchpoints - that's why I went", or "I never turn down an invitation" or "I added points for superior Declarer play". The basic goal these people have is sound - TO WIN MORE MATCHPOINTS ON A HAND THAN EVERYONE ELSE. However, they have not considered the other side of this aim - TO LOSE AS LITTLE POSSIBLE SHOULD YOU BE WRONG. Throughout these articles I will be returning to these two 'rules of thumb'.

At IMPs, you would want to stretch to be in a 40% game (vulnerable) for if you are wrong you will lose only 6 IMPs - BUT if you stay out of the game, and are wrong, you will lose 10 IMPs. Therefore, in order to LOSE as little as possible should you be wrong, you must bid the game. At MATCHPOINTS you lose the same amount if you are wrong to bid the game as you do if you are wrong NOT to bid the game. Therefore, you must try to increase your chance of not being wrong. When the decision is simply whether or not to bid to game, you want your games to be better than even odds to make - at least 50%. Not bidding a risky game can not only help keep your score card steady, it may very well reap unexpected rewards. Let's say you DO out-declare every other player. Plus 170 will net you just as much of a top as plus 420 when the 'field' is making only 3 or going down one, and plus 140 is a juicy score when the traveller is dotted with -50. How, you may ask, does one be sure whether or not a game is 50% or better? You must simply use your judgement and whatever hand evaluation tools you have available. PLUS you and partner must agree to not overstate the value of your hands. It is hard to judge correctly in a close decision if the information you have received is exaggerated. Bid as accurately as possible. WHERE IS THE FIELD? There are going to be times when you can see that the prospects of making a game is almost certainly less than 50% BUT you can also see that the 'Field' is sure to be there. 'Point count games' are a good example of this where you and partner have the points for game but your knowledge of the cards makes you think the game will not make. The fact that the field is going to bid the game should sway you to bidding it yourself. If you are wrong and the contract goes set, you will have lot's of company and won't lose that many matchpoints. However, if you don't bid the game, and the contract makes, (maybe RHO has a tough lead or there's a fortuitous 109 doubleton lurking) you stand to lose a lot more. With all decisions at Matchpoints, you must try to not only maximize your gains but minimize your losses. In any game, at any level, a string of 8s,7s,9s, and 10s will win far more often than 12, 0, 11, NEXT ISSUE: I Bid 3NT because it's Matchpoints $0, \frac{1}{2}, 12.$



THE ART OF ESTIMATION Herein I divulge my own personal approach to estimating how well my game is going. I think it is a great method and have won many a bet. This method has two advantages: 1: You don't have to add and 2: You never lose hope. TOP=+ BOTTOM=O AVERAGE+ = ↑ AVERAGE = -At about the halfway point you start 'cancelling out'. You cancel a 0 with a +. or two ↑↑. You cancel a twith the and - against -, and two ware equal to a 0 and must be cancelled by a + . In the end, your score card is covered with pencilled in squares. Sometimes the whole card is filled but if you end up on the plus side, you take half of what is left (eg. $3+=1\frac{1}{2}$ boards) and add it to average. (+=1board += board += board -= 4) Now let's say you started out with two Os, but later in the game you were able to cancel them out against 2 +! The game is back to even. If you are all cancelled out with 6 boards to go, you know you could still end up 3 boards above average! But be tough! Especially in the early rounds. Don't over estimate
