At the November Board meeting, your Unit Executive passed a motion to subsidize unit members who are interested in attending the ACBL Teacher's Accreditation Course, to be held at the Penticton Regional.

The cost of the course is \$100, and the Unit offers a \$50 rebate to any member successfully completing the course, not to exceed ten (10) participants.

The Unit Executive is extremely interested in furthering local bridge through teaching programs. Many of our present teachers are overwhelmed by waiting lists, sometimes

fifty persons long! Although we had intended to run a series on our available teachers, most do not want the extra publicity as they already have more students than they can handle. There is potential in Vancouver for bridge teaching to be a good, full-time job!

The ACBL Club Series teaching program has been praised by all factions. The students love it and become automatic members of the ACBL for six months when they complete the course (Witness Ted Trites 16 or so new members from his West Vancouver classes!)
Teachers love it for the simple and easy approach, as well as all the back-up material.
We love it, as it promotes teaching, learning, duplicate and the ACBL.

YOU DON'T HAVE TO BE AN EXPERT PLAYER TO TEACH THE GAME TO BEGINNERS. We like to envision a fleet of bridge teachers set loose in the city. We are investigating the school system as well, hoping to institute bridge programs in and between the Vancouver high schools.

Other actions by the Unit 430 Board of Directors in 1989.

Copies of the Membership List will be made available to club managers and organizers, although ACBL requires that point holdings not be made public. These membership lists will cost \$5.00 to cover copying.

The Unit will rent out bidding boxes at a cost of \$1 per table/session, plus a refundable security deposit of \$10 per set.

The Unit will sponsor and organize the non-sanctioned Inter-City IMP Pairs Trials Flights A & B and put it under the jurisdiction of the Special Pairs co-ordinator.

The unit will award free plays to six sectional sessions in the following year to each year's winners of the Edie Bonnell and Under 200 Trophy Races. These free plays are nontransferable and non-refundable.

The Unit will continue the monthly unit games, trophy race and free coffee through 1990. There will be two draws/game for free plays but no free plays will be awarded to the winners.



- Adopted a new schedule of dues and fees that will not go into effect until after full review at the Fort Worth Board of Directors meeting.

ACEL HEADQUARTERS TO MOVE

ACBL headquarters will move from the building at 2200 Democrat Road, home since the League moved to Memphis in 1972, to a four-story building on Airways Boulevard, only a short distance from present Headquarters. The many new programs have caused severe crowding in the old location, but the new site will have plenty of room for expansion. The ACBL hopes that the move will be complete by February.

WE NEED OUR LOCALS: In 1983 the Vancouver Regional was in danger of being terminated, due to high costs common to city center. Then, the local players, ably led by then Chairman Doug Cowan, gathered in support. Representing 40% of the total table count, unit 430's great support helped to cement Vancouver's claim to a permanent slot on the DINO regional schedules. That year, the table count was 2,649, only a few short of the District 19 record. Having a regional in our own home town is a wonderful thing for local players, with good savings on travel and accommodation expenses. Every one of us can be a great help just by showing up to play! This will be Vancouver's twelfth regional.

Players qualify for the VANCOUVER LEVEL as individuals but qualify for the NATIONAL level as pairs. There is about \$2,000 in expected subsidy to help with travel costs, usually received by the top two or maybe three pairs.

Second round results are not all in for the Flight B League. The opening lead goes to the Ace and, after some thought. East returns the heart ten as you shed a club. West overtakes with the King and plays a third heart. What heart? Yes, it might be useful to know which heart West plays, but Bryden used to work in a

drycleaning plant and thinks spots are for leopards; well, not entirely. You do notice East throw the Diamond 8 as you pitch another club. So East likes Diamonds, hmm? You run the Queen, low from East- maybe you'll pin the Jack and roll up the whole suit. No, West wins the King and clears the Hearts. That's curious, you think, as you and East both sluff clubs. Adrian and I enjoy frequent games together down at the Haida Club. Recently, on one particular hand, Adrian showed me why, during his long and illustrious bridge career, he was able to win so many championships and become Western Canada's first Life Master.

OOO Some Practical Applications by Lauren Miller

As many of us are aware, the ACBL has recently been trying to emphasize and propagate the concept of 'Active Ethics'. Briefly stated, one of the main tenets of active ethics is that every player should aggressively go out of his/her way to ensure that

the opponents are fully informed - whether or not he/she is legally required to do so. The object of this exercise it to ensure that everyone's score be determined strictly by skill and 'normal' luck, not by the fact that one's opponents are not playing on a level field. While the intention of the active ethics program is admirable, there seems to have been a lack of concrete examples which show how a player can be actively ethical. I would like to share a few ideas on this and would encourage others to do the same.

First, a personal anecdote. In my early days of playing bridge, I was playing a hand where I could only lose one more trick to make my contract. My RHO had the master trump (the only one outstanding) and I had two side suit losers in my hand. The lead was in dummy, which contained J64 of diamonds, the only cards remaining in that suit. Thus, I could play a winning diamond and discard one of my losers when RHO ruffed, but I would still have another loser. Only if I could persuade RHO not to ruff the first diamond would I be able to ditch both my losers . So I called 'small diamond'. RHO, accordingly deceived, did not ruff and I made my contract. At the time I thought myself terribly clever, but when I later learned more about the game and its ethical obligations, I realized my little ploy was not a proper thing to do. If I had called for the four of diamonds, and RHO had still gone wrong, at least I would not have tried to mislead him by using the loaded word 'small'.

One way to practise active ethics is to alert the opponents to any non-standard bids, leads or treatments which they may not be aware of, even if they are not technically alertable (the alert system has some holes in it, as we all know). Sometimes you should not do this until the auction is over, depending on whether the information will help your partner more than the opponents. As an example, I often play that the lead of a Jack denies a higher card in that suit, and I try to remember to alert when partner leads a Jack (or a 10 or 9). Even though I have 'Jack denies higher' written on my convention card, the opponents do not seem to notice this section of the card very readily. On one occasion, my partner led a Jack agains 3NT. I alerted the lead, declarer asked for an explanation, and proceeded to go up with Ace from AQx in dummy, dropping my singleton King (partner wanted to cram my alert down my throat, but that's another story). Some play that a double of a 1H overcall is negative and denies holding four or more spades. If you use this treatment, I think you should say 'special alert' or something along those lines to ensure the opponents know it's not a traditional negative double (which would also be alerted, although perhaps it shouldn't be).

Another problematical issue is the legitimacy of what is called 'table feel'. I believe that, especially in regular partnerships, players pick up a lot of information (often unconsciously) from their partners which can constitute an unfair advantage. How often have you heard, "I really should have bid game (or whatever), but it didn't feel right". I'm convinced that sometimes a bid or play 'feels right' because partner has made a slight break in tempo, nervous mannerism, change in normal speaking voice or intonation, or a whole host of other indications which would be imperceptible to a stranger but are informative to a familiar partner. I have imposed a rather rigid rule upon myself in this situation, to wit: 'Never mind your feelings, just make the right play'. I'm not suggesting everyone adopt this rule, but I do think it takes a high degree of self-awareness to be able to distinguish when your 'table feel' is based on factors which are as accessible to your opponents as they are to you. I don't have that much self-awareness.



ACTIVE ETHICS (continued)

As a final point, I would like to refer to Rose Wrean's excellent article in the October Matchpointer where she detailed various ways in which some players abuse, intimidate and humiliate their opponents (and partners) - sometimes with malice aforethought, sometimes out of sheer thoughtlessness. In addition to the violations of common decency and harm to the image of duplicate bridge these actions entail, they are also actively unethical in that they create an atmosphere where factors other that skill and normal luck are used to determine the result of the game. Let your opponents fear coming to your table because of your card-playing wizardry, not your capacity for emotional brutality!

IT PAYS TO BE A GOOD PARTNER by David Schmidt

Everyone knows you're supposed to be a good partner, supportive of partner's efforts even while you may be cringing inside, not giving up just because you're disgusted with a board, etc. etc. But it can be difficult to do and sometimes we question whether it's worth the effort. I know it is!

Having gone to Seaside only to play on a ringer Flight B Knockout Team (we finished a disappointing 3/4), I depended on the partnership desk for the pair events. For Friday's Flight B Super Open Pairs, I was paired with an elderly woman from Port Alberni. She needed a partner because her husband wanted a "better" player than her and was trying his luck in the Flight A's. Although she was most pleasant to play with, our results were not noteworthy. We struggled to average plus in the first session, then ended up well below average in the second session. Despite the poor results, I tried not to be discouraged and attempted to work for every matchpoint.

Since this had been a tupical lacklustre result. I was getting sick of pickup partners by Saturday's Stratified Pairs event. Imagine my surprise, then, when an elderly gentleman (Henry Anderson of Port Alberni) came to me as I was finishing my knockout match and announced that his wife and the partnership desk had decided we should play together that day. His wife (Pearl) was the woman I had played with the day before. Apparently she had been impressed with both my conduct and my play and decided I was the "better player" her husband was looking for.

Pearl turned out to be a good matchmaker as we ended up second in Flight B and tenth in Flight A, surprising everyone except possibly Pearl.

Why did we do so well? First, we both tried to live up to our advance billing. In a way, Henry had foisted himself on me so he did not want to disappoint the "good player" his wife had found. In my case, I had been "oversold" and had to be extra sharp so as not to let down Henry's expectations. Our styles fit well but, more importantly, we did everything that makes you a good "partner": respected each other's abilities, tried to make bids partner would understand and played our hands to the best of our ability. When we did get a poor result, we did not point fingers. That last point is crucial. In two rounds of bridge, we never had two poor results in a row.

Yes, it's both more pleasant and more rewarding to be a good partner. By being a good partner one day, I got a good partner the next. By being a good partner the second day, I got a good result.

THE DINOSAUR THAT WASN'T

At our recent Round-up Sectional, there was a 'Walk Through History' taped to the back wall, displaying lists of previous winners at this sectional. These simple sheets reached back some seventeen years and represented a lot of memories for our unit members.

Memories like these are a great part of bridge today. As the baby boom bubble of players enter and leave their second decade with the game, memories, history and tradition begin to take on more substance, and play a key role in solidifying the body that is bridge in our unit and in the ACBL. It is through history that we are all joined. New players, new winners, new unit executives are all connected, to each other and to the lists of members whose names can be found in similar positions marching backward through time; marching past milestones of change, past landmark decisions and past events which have changed the face of bridge forever. We are, as a group, a product of this past and the people who participated in its

Today, bridge is a new game, as it must be in order to carry us into a rapidly changing and demanding future. However, in our eager efforts to swing into a new day. I believe bridge organizers are in danger of missing a crucial step along the way. With all the new events, new programs, new tournaments and new and new and new, we seem to have forgotten that an institution without history is an empty shell. It is tradition and ritual that give depth and inspiration to human effort. We can cry NEW! and NEVER DONE BEFORE! and many will show up, but when we participate in something new, one of the urges to do so is the thought that we may be taking part in something historical. If, year after year, the event carries no history, interest will eventually die.

Some of the posters on our Round-up wall listed winners of events which no longer exist. These were nostaligic memorials to the bridge dinosaurs, such as the Masters' and the Unmixed Pairs; events which, in their awkwardness, were doomed to museums as soon as the modern world could invent a superior animal; events which, in a way, evolved into the present day tradition.

There is, however, one grand old beast that has just recently fallen, leaving its bones still fresh in the hearts and annals of bridge around the world- The Men's

The Vancouver Unit no longer runs a Men's Pairs, Men's Pairs are no longer found on regional schedules. In fact, at the November Board meeting in Lancaster, the ACBL itself decided to eliminate all Men's events from the National Championships schedules. Gone are the Life Master Men's Pairs, the Men's Board-A-Match and the Men's Swiss Teams. At the world level, too, Men's events have been deleted. With one huge sweep of the hand, Men's events have become extinct across the board.

How, and why, did this happen? The processing of this change is murky. It is somehow linked to the emancipation of men and women in today's society. It is somehow linked to the sexual revolution of the sixties; somehow linked to the changing of Chairman to Chairperson, and the painting over of the Men's and Ladies & Escorts signs on the doors of drinking rooms; somehow linked to househusbands, the gay olympics and verbal versus spatial skills- but I still don't get it. The Women's events remain in place. What was wrong with the Men's that is not wrong with the

Usually a thing will die off when it is no longer needed, or when it is overcome by something that is stronger. For instance, there are those partnerships of mixed gender, unable to play on Men's and Women's days. The table count of Men's events has always been lower than that of the Women's. So, we will just eliminate the Men's and all the guys can play in an Open Pairs. Our table count will go up

Please wait ten seconds. Here is an example of the missing step. In our eagerness for change and improvement, we may have erred. We have neither transformed nor replaced the tradition...the history. What we have done is invented the Open Pairs, Friday Aft. A nothing, really, just another event. On regional schedules, we have forced yet another Open Pairs- playthrough no doubt. Our local Vancouver Regional now has three two-session Open Pairs; one to replace the Mixed, one to join the Seniors and now one to replace the Men's.

In our headlong rush to follow modern trends and rid ourselves of a useless tooth, we have failed to investigate the chances of a new tooth growing into the gap. We have, in fact, inserted a false tooth, a plug to keep the rest in line, while we await the arrival of a new tradition.

At the Nationals, where the ACBL decided to yank out the Men's Events, a contest was immediately posted. Name the Game, it was titled, and offered a prize to the individual who came up with a winning name for the three new Open Pairs events. To quote the article, Lancaster Daily Bulletin, Saturday, November 11, 1989:

"These unrestricted events are ... full fledged North American Championships. However, they need to be distinguished from other Open Pair Championships that stand alone."

Perhaps a name WILL fill the gap. I suspect, though, that the new events will become the Saturday Open Pairs as opposed to the Monday Open Pairs and none will 'stand alone'. The events will remain attractive only for their point awards. For all their objective value, these new events do nothing for the fabric of the game.

And what about the Men's events? Certainly the difference between men and women is not a thing of the past, an archaic anomaly which the modern world seems bound to erase. It is a real and glorious fact. Sometimes, it is fun to compete in a field made up totally of one gender: with similar physical, emotional and intellectual make-ups; with similar cultural and social challenges. It is different than an open game. It feels good - once in a while. Why have half of us lost this opportunity?

Did we find the Men's events a threat to the health of the game? Certainly an Open Pairs, Friday Aft., is not strong enough to overtake the Men's Pairs tradition. Assuming that the Men's was a threat, what did it threaten? With the elimination of Men's events, we now have a Women's and an Open. Personally, as a woman and a competitive and active player, this looks a lot more threatening than a Women's and a Men's. What is being implied here? And, perhaps more significantly, what will be implied about the women who do not enter the Open? The seemingly innocent and unheralded elimination of Men's events represents the beginning of a ripple, in fact a wave, that will course through the future of bridge as we know it; changes are taking place, ever so small, but huge in the grand design.

An what about the men? They have been robbed of a great tradition and I feel badly for them. Why were no voices raised? Are the men of today so numbed by the past twenty years of socio-sexual change that they did not know if this was a just cause or not? Equality, rights, consciousness raising, room at the top, the glass ceiling, networking, I agree it can all be confusing. Sometimes an animal will just lie low until the traffic dies down. But do our male players truly not want an all male event, at least once in a while? If this is true, it is certainly at odds with the rest of their lives and with society.

At our Round-up sectional, people enjoyed the 'Walk through History'. The dinosaurs were respected and remembered fondly as one recalls a childhood. The new, transformed events, flighted pairs, stratified pairs, are fast becoming respected replacements for the old. Only that one tradition, the Men's Pairs, stood out forlornly. The Women's Pairs carried on into the future. The Men's Pairs ended abruptly, with a 'Discontinued, 1989'. In its place there will be an Open Pairs, Friday Aft. There was a kind of silence in the crowd reading that list, as there must have been in the crowd surroudning the last computer print-out for the last Life Master Men's Pairs in Lancaster. Only one voice asked me why we no longer ran a Men's Pairs. As president of our unit, and long-time participant in bridge organization, I had no answer. The question, and the compilation of the 'Walk' did start me thinking, and today I write this article.

Perhaps one of the reasons for declining interest and membership in bridge is not so much that our traditions are bad, but that they have been lost. Without them, we have had to think up better and more improved immediate rewards to attract our players. More kinds of points, more kinds of events, different kinds of prizes (even cash), more categories, the list is endless. There are times when it seems we are doing more scrambling than building and developing. In the bridge world, I am young, and I certainly support and promote a more modern packaging for the game. On the other hand, we need to be careful. We do not want to end up holding a nice glitzy box that has nothing inside.
