







Ah, you see, there's a catch! In this deal, you've gotten the lead of the K♥ and you have problems in trumps and hearts. If you finesse and lose, you go down. If you play the ace of trumps and the K does not drop, you still have a chance to make the contract if you can get the player holding the K to follow to the enough clubs so that you pitch two heart losers from dummy. Sadly for me, my partner (who shall go nameless) didn't see the alternate line and went down by finessing.

Which play is better? What do you estimate the percentage chance of each play to be?
