1. (IMP Pairs, none vul.) - 75 ค QT96 $\diamond$ Q943 * 953

Partner opens ONE CLUB in third seat and RHO overcalls ONE SPADE. You pass and LHO bids ONE NOTRUMP. Partner PASSES and RHO continues with TWO DIAMONDS. You pass again and LHO prefers to TWO SPADES. Partner DOUBLES this and RHO PASSES. It's your call.
2. (IMPs, none vul.) - 842 『 K542 ○ JT8 K K J

Partner opens 1 NT in first seat, PASS from RHO. It's your call. What are you going to do after partner's next bid, assuming the opponents remain silent?
3. (Matchpoints)

- Q7 © A - 97652 KQJ32

You are the dealer; it's your call. (Don't tell me the vulnerability matters; I won't believe you.)

## 4. (IMPs, we're vul.)

\& Q © KQ96432 ○A7 AK5
That darn partner preempts with THREE SPADES as dealer; RHO PASSES. It's your bid.
5. (Matchpoints, opps vul.) - K98 『 72 - KT98654 5 You open THREE DIAMONDS as dealer. RHO observes two PASSES and tries THREE NOTRUMP. This buys it. It's your bid-er, it's your lead.

The bidding system in use is summarized on the other side of this detachable strip.

The "It's Your Bid" System (taken from the International Bidder's Club, an on-line Monthly Bidding Contest, at www.bridgespace.com)

- Natural, five-card majors. Limit raises.
- Over I in a major, 2 NT is gameforcing and shows 4 -card support.
- Splinter bids: all double-jump shifts, by responder as well by opener.
- 2 over 1 promises a rebid; not game forcing.
- Strong jump shifts.
- After a reverse, responder's 2 NT or fourth suit is negative.
- Opening $2 \stackrel{\wedge}{ }, 20,20$ : 6 -card suit, 5-11. $2 \mathrm{NT}=$ forcing, game try.
- Opening $1 \mathrm{NT}=15-17,2 \mathrm{NT}=20-22$.
- Over NT openings or overcalls: Stayman, Jacoby transfers, Texas, Gerber. Lebensohl after two-level overcalls (through 2NT shows a stopper).
- Opening 2 artificial, strong. $20=$ waiting bid. Natural responses.
- Opening $3 \mathrm{NT}=$ gambling.
- Roman Keycard Blackwood (0314), 5NT asks specific kings.
- Over opponent's take-out double, new suit is forcing at one level, $2 \mathrm{NT}=$ limit raise, jump shift is pre-emptive.
- Support doubles and redoubles.
- Over overcalls cuebid is limit raise+, or any game-force.
- Negative, competitive and responsive doubles through $4 \diamond$, higher than that: value-showing.
- Weak jump overcalls.
- Direct jump cue-bid asks stopper.
- Common sense.

# A Old Friend Returns 

"It's Your Bid" is back after $\mathbf{1 5}$ years!

By far the most popular feature in the history of the Matchpointer is "It's Your Bid." This series began in 1969 and continued in almost every issue until a meagre seven people responded in October 1985 to the questions posed in the previous issue. Oddly enough, in the same issue nineteen survey responses were received by editor Lauren Miller showing that "It's Your Bid" was more popular than most other Matchpointer items. At least twelve of these respondents, apparently, decided not to send in answers.

Has it really been nearly fifteen years? Of course, "It's Your Bid" was pretty much like the present day counterpart in the ACBL Bulletin, and was originally modeled after the Bidding Challenge in The Bridge World. What made it special was that the moderator took the assembled comments and made them readable and entertaining. This may have contributed to its demise-it is difficult to mail a letter to such a contest if you know that any wrong answer will stick out and be highlighted. However, these days we have email, answering machines, and even stratification! And-say I, pointing at myself-we have a editor who has wanted to do this for some time.

So-let's do it all again.
The rules: Five problems are printed on the right hand side of the cover, which is to be removed and sent in, (If you do so, you'll find the removal reveals a handy table of contents for the whole issue.) Despite the name of the contest, you are not always asked to make a call-sometimes it will be an opening lead or even a defensive or declaring play. Write your answers down, using as a bidding system that of the basic

Five Card Major system summarized on the back of the cover strip. If you wish, write the answer you would give in a "modern" system if different.

If you include comments on any of your answers I shall place you in Flight A and your comments (and mine on them!) will be treated as fair game-so you may as well comment on them all. If not, indicate whether you are an experienced player (Flight B) or a newer player (Flight C). I'll list the top scores in each flight, and I invite all players to participate.

NOTE: At least one of the problems will be taken from previous issues of the Matchpointer. We'll include some answers from long ago with the contemporary ones to see what's changed.

The scoring will be...completely subjective! You may even influence the scoring with comments, although I will seldom print or read more than about thirty words from anyone on each deal. There will be 100 points maximum on any hand, and the emphasis will not be on what worked at the table (in most cases the hands will be from actual play), but what rates to work most often.

I won't take more than a set of answers over the phone-if you want to send comments you must mail or e-mail me, or catch me on the street somewhere and subpoena me with your answers. Maybe the best way would be for club managers to keep It's Your Bid envelopes for responses, and I can collect them before the next issue. Remember to classify yourself as Flight A, B, or C-or I shall. Feel free to send along better problems for next time, all will be considered.

We need responses from players of all levels for this to be a success.

## Who Wants To Be A Nominee?

The Annual General Meeting of Unit 430 will take place shortly after the first Saturday session, May 20, of the Spring sectional at Bonsor. For those not playing in the first session, we expect that the session will end about $3: 30$ and the meeting will start at $3: 45$ or so. There is ample time during the break to attend the meeting (which will be over by $4: 30$ at the latest), since the second session doesn't start until 7:30 pm.

At the meeting there will be a recap of the year so far from Unit President Brad Bart, and a summary of Unit Finances by Treasurer Pete Walton. Board Members will answer any questions Unit members may have. Most importantly, we will
be presented with a list of nominees for election to the Board for a two-year term beginning July 1, 2000.

Nominations from the floor will be accepted at the meeting. If there are more nominees than vacancies, ballots will be distributed and an election will be held.

At the Matchpointer deadline, only two nominees were known, but it was known that there are many maybes out there! Also uncertain at press time was the number of vacancies on the Unit Board.

If an election is necessary, the President will introduce any nominees present, and time permitting, let the nominees in attendance speak briefly if they wish. Ballots will then be distributed and a ballot box will be set up. Ballots will be accepted until shortly after the end of the first session of the Swiss Teams on Monday. The results will be announced during the second session of the Swiss Teams.

## Finn Schultz

42 years of directing!
Just about anyone who has played bridge in the greater Vancouver area during the past 40 plus years owes some credit to Finn Schultz.
"I've been directing for 42 years," the affable 80 -year-old notes; "over the years, I have run ten different clubs."

Schultz still directs two games/week, running eight-table games in Tsawassen Monday night and White Rock Tuesday afternoons, although he will likely retire this year. "I think it's time for someone else to take over."

Schultz played a little bridge in his native Denmark but didn't really take up the game until he emigrated to Vancouver in 1951. He took night school bridge lessons, learning the (now-banned) Neapolitan club system and began playing regularly at the North Shore Bridge Club (which eventually became the Pemberton Club) and other clubs. When NSBC director Peter Holmes was transferred out-of-town and planned to shut down the club, Schultz stepped up.
"I said that if he taught me how to run the game, I would take it over."

Schultz's biggest claim to fame is the White Rock Bridge Club which he started in 1962 and ran for 35 years. Over the years he has also directed in Vancouver and Richmond, including the "big game at the Airport Inn" which attracted up to three sections.
"At one point I was working all day and running bridge games five nights a week," he recalls.

Over the years, Schultz has noticed a lot of changes. The big games of the past are long gone and so are many of the players. The ones who remain are all aging. "We just don't get the young people any more."

Schultz offers several reasons for the drop in numbers:

- People are afraid of duplicate and it's hard to keep them.
- There is a proliferation of clubs today. "When

I started there were only three or four clubs to play at. Now there are half a dozen clubs in Vancouver alone."

- It's difficult to compete with private winter clubs or Chi-cago-style social bridge clubs which "charge only $\$ 1 /$ session and offer the winners $\$ 5$."
- Computers are taking away younger players. "A lot of them play computer games and forget about bridge," Schultz notes, adding even bridge players are turning to the computer. "It's fantastic. You can sit at the computer and play with someone in South Africa or wherever."
- The atmosphere has changed. "It's a whole new attitude now. In the past there was a completely different atmosphere. The main thing is the sociable part of the game has disappeared."

Not that bridge in the old days was perfect. Some players (who shall remain unmentioned) were extremely difficult at the table although Schultz notes those who still play have "mellowed" with age.

There were also problems with "with life masters and juniors. In the old days there was an attitude that the life masters were very hard on newcomers."

One of Schultz's main reasons to start directing was to counter that.
"My main focus has always been to encourage new players," he says, adding "Over the years, I brought about 800 members into the Vancouver unit."

Many players he nurtured have gone on to great bridge careers.
"I remember when young kids barely out of their teens like Paul Hagen, Jim Dickie, Jim Donaldson and Mike Strebinger were just starting out on the North Shore," he notes.

Of a more recent vintage, Schultz recalls regularly picking up Cam Doner and taking him to the White Rock club when Doner was starting out.

Seeing players like that has been "my reward. I hope they think kindly of me when they're winning."

## Give Me A Hand

## by Joerg Schneider

The scene: STaC game Wednesday night at Albert's.


Those arriving in 6NT had no problem: twelve tricks are on top: two clubs, one diamond, five spades, and four hearts.

Those playing in six spades will also come home as long as they keep their wits about. Win the lead in hand, cash the jack of spades, cross to the ace of hearts, cash four more spades, cash the hearts, etc.

At our table the auction went:

The opening lead was the queen of clubs and I now played a heart to the ace and a heart back, with the idea of pulling all the trumps and overtaking in spades. This line works when hearts are 4-2. If East has long spades, you finesse in diamonds and even if it loses you have the rest of the tricks. If West has long spades, you cash only three spades then give up a diamond, endplaying whoever has the king. This must add up to $90 \%$ or better, but today was not the day for that line! When West showed out on the second round of trumps the hand could no longer be made.

However, six hearts can be made. Cash the kingqueen of hearts, and when West shows out play the jack of spades, ace of diamonds, ruff a diamond high, reaching this position:

## North: AKQT8 * T9 <br> West: (immaterial) <br> East: \$9654 》 T86 South: © J7 ©QJT \$ K8

Now you play four rounds of spades from dummy, pitching three diamonds and a club from your hand, then lead the last spade. If East ruffs in with the 8 (or 10 ), you pitch your Ke and wait with J-7 of trumps over the T-6 (or 8-6). If East ruffs low, you overruff, cash the high trump and concede the last trick.

It does not help East to underruff the diamond with the 6 (when you ruff a diamond high to reach the board and its good spades). In this case, East keeps his small club and if he plays it on the fifth spade, you can ruff small and your jack of hearts is the twelfth trick.

The best contract of seven spades was reached at only one table-it fails only on the $6-0$ trump break, a $98.5 \%$ grand slam. Tough luck for enterprising bidding!

## Tips for Tops

Today's tip is: Be more aggressive in the bidding.
I'm playing with a nice person I've known a long time but never partnered before. She's been extremely cautious in the bidding so far-I suspect that's because she has fond memories from years of receiving big plusses when sitting left or right of me-and so between rounds, I gently suggest that we might get just a tad more aggressive. She doesn't say anything, but gives me a very long, very uncertain (and very wideeyed) stare. There's no time to discuss it further, 'cause our next opponents (two ladies who don't seem to ever have any problem with their bids or defensive signals or opening leads) have settled in and are licking their chops. On the very next board I pick up...

I decide that this is not up to my usual standard for a weak two as dealer, especially red versus white, but unfortunately I seem to have come to that conclusion after placing the stop card on the table. I'm obliged to do something "jumpy" I suppose, and so naturally I decide to start with a "this-is-what-I-mean-byaggressive" $3 \varnothing$ call (let me know when you've stopped laughing and I'll carry on...okay, it's been five minutes, I think that's enough snickering). LHO quickly (at the same instant that my three heart bid hits the table) produces the very takeout double card, partner finds a 48 call, and RHO fishes around and eventually finds the sort-of-penalty double card. I'm sure some of you don't discriminate between the double cards in most bid boxes, but rest assured they are dissimilar; I've identified at least five distinctly different "Big Red" cards (and even a couple more on some of these people's better days). The auction screeches to a halt (I hate that sound), and here I am... doubled... again. At least I know can expect a rock-crusher from this partner, so maybe I'll have some play for down two...

The opening lead is the ace of spades, and my conservative, stodgy partner carefully sets down what can only be described as somewhat-less-than-regulation rock-crushing equipment.

It seems my little hint on us being more hawkish has had its effect. That's somewhat unexpected, and as this is the first time in my long experience that any partner has ever taken my advice on anything, it also somehow seems rather unfair (pout). At any rate, I can see that at least I do indeed, in spite of everything, have a very good play for down two (sigh).

Now, for some reason, I get it into my head that I might muck around for awhile and somehow manage to hold this dumb contract to down one (at the moment I have absolutely no idea how this might be accomplished), so after the ace, king and queen of spades from LHO (I ruffed the last one, I'm not a mucker), I lead a little trump to the queen. RHO wins with the heart ace and exits with the queen of clubs which I win in dummy with the ace. I'd like to be able to squeeze someone somehow (that's always impressive) and get out for down one, so I suppose I should be counting something at this point, but I'm not sure what... I decide to at least look like I have some plan, and so I stare at the dummy, peruse their convention card, count trumps, count my blessings, and count my own cards. (Stop laughing; who knows, maybe the board has been fouled, and I won't have to play this after all!) Eventually I abandon counting, and go back to mucking around. With nothing better to do, I start peeling off all the trumps I can find, reducing my assets to:

Notice I've gotten conservative, and kept one little trump, just in case... I don't like being "heartless" (bad pun, groan here). I remember that I forgot to count up my losers, but that should be easy... lessee, they already have three tricks so far, and a trick to get in each of the minors yet, so I haven't even rectified the count for down one. That seems to eliminate the squeeze possibility I was thinking of (please don't ask what type of squeeze-I've developed Alzheimer's recently). I finally guess to just cash out what I can, rather than make this any worse or more embarrassing.

BINGO!!! I cash the last trump, and LHO shifts around uncomfortably in her chair. I dunno what is happening, but I try to look like I expected this all along, so I smile and nod knowingly at her. What the heck her problem is, I have absolutely no idea, but I don't want her to know that. At any rate, she eventually drops the club ten, and when I cash the king of clubs, she follows with the nine as her partner plays the jack! I stare at the eight of clubs for a few seconds, but I'm pretty sure it's good now. Yes, indeedydoody, mucking around has paid off, and the opponents have made a mistake or something, and I'm going to be down only one! I play this last club with glee, and now LHO scowls again!!! Unbelievably, she discards the queen of diamonds. The spade nine isn't

doing me much good, so I decide to throw that and hope the diamond finesse is coming home, but I don't have to worry about it, because when I lead the diamond seven LHO follows with the king and I have ten tricks. This is the greatest pleasure in bridgedom. I shuffle the cards nonchalantly, and slide them into the little pocket with the bored look all those experts seem to have that says "Didn't even work up a sweat over that one, pard." I know nothing but I look like I know everything, and what more could one want out of life?

As I'm basking in the glow of the post-mortem, my LHO is, of course, blaming my RHO for not returning a diamond after winning her ace of hearts, but it really makes no difference to the end position. In fact, the only way to beat this is for LHO to have made the diamond switch herself at trick two or trick three. Of course, I let her rant on for a few minutes before pointing this out to her partner, who smiles at me appreciatively.

As you can see, things just got progressively better and better as the trumps came down, which happens to be exactly what this endplay is called a progressive squeeze. I like this one, cause you don't have to count (which is difficult) or rectify (which sounds rude) or anything: just play off all those nasty trumps until one of them squirms (I love watching them do that, don't you?) and throws the wrong thing. And then, you get to play the winner they just gave you and watch them squirm some more! Of course, you have to remember what cards are winners and stuff, but that's not too hard most of the time.

Here's the complete hand...


So, what have we learned here? Well, it seems that bidding more aggressively works okay. Also, that even when we don't have squeezes, the opponents seem to get squeezed if we let them...and that all players discard badly sometimes. Oh. And we learned not to double me when I preempt (heh heh). 2dalu...

## Questions

## by Bruce McIntyre

To improve your standard of play, you probably need to ask more questions. Not to the opponents ("What did four diamonds show?"); no, not that. Not even to partner ("Did you read my six as encouraging at trick five?'); no, not that either. To get better you have to start asking questions-silently, please-to yourself.

It's a painful process, frustrating, because the improving player and especially the beginning player has lots of questions, but few which are relevant. For example, a beginner might first ask himself what to do if the trump suit splits $5-0$. The expert proba-
bly asks first if he can make it on a 4-1 split, and then looks for possibilities if it's worse. Usually once you work out the play that succeeds against 4-1, you've found or are about to find the one that also covers 5-0. (Or you can do what I do and say "who cares if they split 50?")

Not only that, the non-expert has to develop an instinct about when to ask himself (or herself) the pertinent questions. You can't just ask yourself silent questions until you hit the right one three weeks later. Often the question I'm asking myself when playing against a newer player is "What is he thinking about now?"

British writer Danny Roth, in his book on defense (Signal Success In Bridge), proposes one basic ques-
tion to ask yourself as often as possible: "What on Earth is going on here?" (Experts tend to substitute the word "the" for "on" and various unprintable words for "Earth.")

So play a hand with me. I'll ask the questions, and IIl even help you answer them:

## - - $\mathrm{K} 85 \diamond$ AKQ9875 $\&$ K74

Matchpoints; opponents are vulnerable, you deal and open ONE DIAMOND. LHO overcalls ONE SPADE; partner bids TWO HEARTS. There can't be much left over for RHO and he contributes a PASS. You cuebid TWO SPADES, not because of the void, but because of the general strength

SELTENRICH survived a close race for third place. MAZUR and LAI were neck and neck all season until the final round, when MAZUR scored a $24 V P$ victory to take first place. Does LAI have a surprise in store for the trophy match?

The Unit Board laid the groundwork for IMP League changes for next year at its April meeting. To sketch out the details, we need input from players.

Here's the basic plan for 2000-2001:
FLIGHT A: Higher team entry fee, may be $\$ 150$ or more. Cash prizes. Serious competition, all matches to be played at VBC in separate rooms. Strict enforcement of scheduling and roster rules. Screens may be used in the playoffs.

FLIGHT B: $\$ 30$ team entry fee. Two strats, maximum increased to 5000 MP , about half of the teams will be in flight B2. Teams in B2 will have a separate playoff. B2 teams qualifying for B1 playoffs may contest both! The B-League Trophy goes to the B1 winner.

FLIGHT C: $\$ 25$ team entry fee. All players must be non Life-Masters. If there is enough interest, Flight C will be stratified as Flight B is.

We'll have more details in the August Matchpointer. A survey to hone these ideas will appear at the sectional and at the VBC, where most matches are played. We hope you'll give us your views.
of the hand. This shuts the opponents up and when partner rebids THREE DIAMONDS, you jump to SIX DIAMONDS.

LHO leads the king of spades; here's the dummy:

Here's a good time to start asking yourself questions. Silently, remember: no moving your lips.

What are my chances of making
this? Pretty good. You have ten tops, and finding the queen of hearts will be enough to make this with ease.

What are my matchpoint prospects? In a good field, you're probably with some of the field in 60 . In an average or weaker field, you're way ahead to be in slam on 26 combined points. Many people don't realize that partner's two heart bid promises five hearts here and will needlessly rebid hearts. The inability to agree on diamonds at the
three level will keep them out of slam. But your key advantage is that you didn't get a club lead-as some unfortunates in $6 \bigcirc$ might. If you find the queen of diamonds you'll make seven (seven diamonds, five hearts and the ace of spades) even though you're off an ace.

Is it $100 \%$ that LHO has the queen of hearts? the ace of clubs? the other club honours? You can virtually place LHO with the ace of clubswithout it he'd have only ten (Contimued on page 10 )

high card points for his vulnerable overcall．The others are not $100 \%$ since people have been known to overcall with twelve．But these other cards are，well over $50 \%$ of the time，going to be in LHO＇s hand．One interesting point is that they have a ten card spade fit and RHO could not make a preemptive raise at his first turn．（Holding a zero count doesn＇t stop people from pre－empting when they see a good fit these days．）Perhaps LHO has seven spades．

What do I pitch from hand on the ace of spades？In IMPs，sure，pitch a heart．After pulling trumps，you can play ace－king－ruff in hearts，re－ turning to the jack of diamonds to pitch two clubs，leaving one loser if hearts break or the queen falls in three rounds，as it almost certainly will．The trouble is，in matchpoints this abandons all hope at making seven，which may add as much as $30 \%$ to your score for the board． So pitch a club and go for it．

Is there any other plan other than pulling trumps and then playing the king of hearts and a low one to the dummy？Yes．You might try lead－ ing the jack of hearts immediately． RHO，with very little information about the distribution so far，may cover，or give you a tell．

What＇s a tell？A tell tells you what he＇s got．Comes from poker．

Time to continue．I＇ll repeat the layout since you＇ve turned the page．

You pitch a club on the ace of spades and play the jack of hearts from dummy．RHO plays a smooth but disinterested deuce． You win the king，LHO playing the three，and pull two rounds of trumps with the ace and king．（LHO has the single－
ton deuce of diamonds．）You lead the five of hearts from hand and LHO plays the seven．You finesse the ten and there＇s good news and bad news．The good news is that the ten wins．The bad news is that RHO hasn＇t got any more．The heart position at trick six，lead in dummy：

> Dummy: 『 A64

LHO：$\vee$ Q9

You：$\vee 8$

Thanks，McBruce．Your cute play of the jack of hearts from dummy has ensured down one．I＇m losing a heart and a club and there isn＇t a thing I can do about it．This is not a question． Think again．

LHO overcalled one spade and had four hearts as well？Yes．

What the unprintable is going on here？Congratulations！Now you＇re thinking like an expert！

This is not an answer！OK，we＇re even．Let＇s see what we have． LHO has four hearts，one dia－ mond，and at least six spades．If he had only five，he might have dou－ bled with 5－4－1－3 distribution in－ stead of overcalling（but I recom－ mend overcalling with hands like that）．Most importantly，if he had only five spades，RHO also has five spades and certainly would never have passed with five card support． This leaves one or two clubs，one of which we know is the ace．

Hey！RHO must have at least one point，since LHO can＇t have two clubs to the AQJ，and we know he has at most two．Good point．So we know that LHO started with six or seven spades to the king－queen，four hearts to the queen，a singleton dia－ mond and the ace of clubs and per－ haps one other．

Aha！Ace of hearts，ruff a heart， jack of diamonds，heart pitching a club， making six，right？Right，but：you can do better．．．

Why are you torturing me like this？ Well，let me confess．When I
played the hand，I made the same jack of hearts play，but first I pulled trumps，ending on the board by leading the five to the jack．So I didn＇t have that option at this point－no convenient re－entry to dummy．But I made seven，and you can too．

Well，it isn＇t a club lead that＇s going to work，and you won＇t let me ruff out hearts so it must be a diamond from dummy．What happens if I lead out my diamonds？Work it out．

OK．Playing all my diamonds re－ duces everyone to three cards．When I lead the last diamond I will have two clubs and a heart in my hand，and three hearts plus the jack of spades in dummy．LHO will be down to the queen of spades，the queen－nine of hearts，and the ace of clubs．If he pitches a heart，I pitch the jack of spades and make three more hearts．If he pitches the ace of clubs，I pitch the third heart from dummy and lead the king of clubs．He＇s squeezed again：if he throws a heart I toss the jack of spades and make two hearts；if he throws the queen of spades，I toss a heart and make the ace of hearts and the jack of spades．But what happens if he tosses the queen of spades？Then you pitch a heart， play a heart to the ace and the jack of spades and give him the last trick．

How did you make seven then？ Easy！LHO pitched the ace of clubs．

But you said he was an expert de－ fender！He was．He decided to hope that partner had the king of clubs． Not so unreasonable，since he started with the ace－doubleton and the clubs had to，be somewhere．If partner had the king then there was no squeeze and we were going down．If partner didn＇t he was pinned to a bad score whether we made six or seven，so why not hope？I might easily have held QJx instead of Kxx in clubs．Even ex－ pert defenders make mistakes：but you have to make them sweat！

## ENG Tais one on in Seattle!

The Grand National Teams, held in Seattle over the March $24-26$ weekend, finished with local teams on top in two of the three flights. First in Flight A was the team of Mike Wilson, Cam Doner, Peter Herold, and Ron Borg. (Canadian teams are now free to compete in the top flight of the GNT now that the event is not used as a qualifier to the Bermuda Bowl for American teams.)

NAOP-The club qualifying period for the 2001 North American Open Pairs begins in June and continues through August. No less than twelve master-point-rich club qualifying sessions have been scheduled as this Matchpointer goes to press. To qualify in a club game all you need to do is break average, or be in the top half of your strat. The strats are A(unlimited), $\mathrm{B}(0-1500), \mathrm{C}(0-500$ non-LM). Players who qualify in the club games can move on to play in the Unit Final in the Fall. About half of the players in the Unit Final will qualify for the District Final this winter, and the top three in each flight at the District Final will qualify to play at the National Final, at the Spring 2001 NABC in Kansas City.

## Only Yesterday

## by Bruce McIntyre

The Matchpointer has been Unit 430's journal of tournament bridge for over 30 years. Back issues exist in people's collections, Unit archives, and a collection at the Vancouver Public Library. It's about time we put that resource to good use.

Each issue, I'll take a look back into Matchpointer history: $5,10,15,20,25$, and maybe more, years ago. To emphasize the looking-back nature of the feature, I'll begin on the antepenultimate page, and continue backwards into available white space through the magazine. We'll take a casual journey backwards in time, without the...dots... and [square brackets] that scholars use to keep things straight. It'll be skewed, as history usually is, by the opinions of today upon the way things used to be done. If the skew is too much for you, or more likely, I've missed something crucial, send comments so we can better understand our bridge past.

Ready? Off we go on the magical history tour!
5 years ago in the Matchpointer (May 1995, Bruce McIntyre, editor)
The big story five years ago was the debate over a 1985 Unit bylaw change, which restricted anyone with a financial interest in a bridge club from serving on the Unit Board. A petition received from the membership thought that the rule should go, but the wording was unspecific and possibly ambiguous. Unit President David Schmidt asked the Unit Board to pass a motion bringing the issue up for debate at the meeting, and the required seven votes were received. We'll tell you what happened at the AGM in the next installment of Only Yesterday.

The Spring 1999 NABC had been awarded to Vancouver only a few months before, and co-chair Doug Cowan took a car trip diagonally across the continent, from Vancouver to Florida and back through Memphis. "ACBL headquarters," wrote Doug, "is located in an attractive but fairly ordinary building, adjacent to the airport, which used to be the worldwide home office of Federal Express. The day of my visit was the first day of the switchover to their new computer system, and of course everyone was concerned that there would be no glitches. The computer really was located under a card table, as reported in a recent Bulletin!"

The District Finals of the GNT were held in Seattle. In Flight C the team captained by Bruce McIntyre lost to the eventual winners in the semis, but the real story was in the round-robin, were McBruce appealed against himself-and won! Holding this hand.

.he heard partner Kel Raywood open 10 in second seat, to his great surprise. Agreements were that a jump to $4 \diamond$ was Roman Keycard here, but the call was alerted and explained as pre-emptive! Kel decided to bid $5 \diamond$ anyway and McBruce raised to 7 NT , which was a claimer. But was the second bid influenced by the mistaken explanation? Maybe, said the Director, changing the result to 6 NT making seven, but suggesting that it was a close decision and an appeal should be launched. The Appeal Committee decided 7NT was reasonable. (These days I like to think I know better and I'd just bid 7NT directly.)

## 10 years ago in the Matchpointer

(May 1990, Jude Goodwin-Hanson, editor)
Ev Hodge volunteered to be Unit 430s first Recorder. The Recorder's job is to collect information submitted by players about possible breaches of ethics, and take action if necessary. As an alternative to taking a complaint to a Unit Committee, it is a way to register concerns without bringing confrontations to the fore. (These days it's Mike Wilson.)

Cam Doner submitted a short piece on psychic bids. He urged players to not take them personally. His first example led to "a satisfactory result"-Cam opened a "weak" 1NT in third seat, the next player bid 2 , his partner corrected to 2 NT , and partner reopened with a double. Cam, who actually held eight diamonds to the AKQT, passed this and collected 1700. The second example was a psychic bid by an opponent, which caused him to go wrong in the play for a poor score which lost the match. "Congratulate your opponent for a great bid and go on to the next board," was Cam's advice.

Bid-boxes, rarely seen in 1990, were needed when Nancy Hurrell developed a throat infection just before the Vancouver Regional. Also needed was a conductor's baton to call cards from dummy, which I happened to have laying around...

In the 1990 Final of the Flight B IMP League, Lois Mazuren's Valley squad defeated the Tai Eng team. An Eng correspondant explained the loss as follows: "A post-mortem on the drive home revealed that the superior ENG squad had lost because of deficiencies in the bidding boxes they had borrowed for the event. The OOPS card was missing so that most Alerts helped the enemy more than the partner, and the TD (Take Back Your Double) card wasn't working properly, causing some local official to hover distractingly over the table asking questions every time it was used."
