

TREASURER'S REPORT

ACBL UNIT 430 VANCOUVER TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2010

The Unit had a net profit of \$11,346 for the year. Of this amount \$3,180 is fund raising revenue that goes directly into the subsidy fund. A further \$2,500 was donated to the subsidy fund, leaving a profit from Unit activities of \$5,666.

Tournaments are the major activities of the Unit. Revenue is up from 2009 due to 87 more tables at 2010 tournaments compared to 2009. This is a 9% increase. However there was a 10% decrease in table count in 2009 so this is basically a recovery of that decrease.

Most tournament expenses are up with the exception of ACBL fees and rent. The decrease in ACBL fees is a result of favorable exchange rates during the year. Rent expense depends on where a tournament is held, as it is not always possible to use the site with the least cost.

The balance sheet remains healthy. Cash is about \$12,000 higher than the prior fiscal year. This is due to unearned revenue of \$4,080 received for a course being held in August 2010, plus income from operations and fundraising in excess of what was paid out.

ACBL Unit 430 is registered for GST and pays almost 5% of its gross revenues to Canada Revenue Agency. Even though we are a not-for-profit organization, registration is required because our gross revenues are over \$50,000 annually.

Effective July 1, 2010 HST came into effect. This means that almost 12% of all revenues collected will have to be remitted to Canada Revenue Agency, as opposed to 5% under GST. On the positive side, we will now recover any PST we were paying, but this is an insignificant amount.

The Board has decided to leave tournament fees unchanged for the September Sectional but will monitor our costs and reassess if necessary.

Director, Director, Director! Staying out of Trouble...with the law...

The Spirit of the Alert Procedure

It is not always easy for a bridge player to know when to alert or not. The principle that will determine whether to alert or not goes like this.

If the opponents are unlikely to know the meaning of your partner's bid, alert.

But remember also that no bid above 3 NT starting with opener's rebid is alertable. Those bids above 3 NT which should be alerted are delayed alert and made prior to the opening lead. If however the opponents take a sacrifice over your slam for example, and you then become defenders, do not alert until the whole hand is played. But if the declarer ask about your partner's bid at any time, you must tell him.

Despite many articles written on the subject, there is confusion on the following situation.

For example: partner opens 1♥ and you respond with a Jacoby 2 NT. Partner forgets to alert and rebid 3♣.

Here is where many players go wrong. They think that they should not alert the 34 bid because this will wake up partner. Wrong! You must alert. If you do not alert, you will only compound the problem. Same thing with Drury or any other bid.

Although this is not an infraction, many players will alert their partner's 2 NT bid after they open a weak two. The 2 NT bid is not alertable, only the responses to it, whether you play Ogust or you ask for feature or singleton.

Another delicate subject... Asking about the opponent's bid. The rule of thumb goes like this.

If you are not going to bid, do not ask about the opponent's bid if it was not alerted.

When you ask about a bid, you are showing interest about that bid. That transmits unauthorized information to your partner. This is more often seen after an ace asking bid, Blackwood or Roman Key card.

If you ask "What is 5 Clubs?" Or "What is 5 diamonds?" and partner leads that suit with 3 little and hits you with values in that suit, your side will need a good argument to convince the director, if he is called at the table, that there was no logical alternative. Do not be surprised if the director changes the result of the deal!

When the auction is over, if you are on lead you may ask for an explanation of the opponent's bids, because you need to plan your defense. This is normal. If your partner is on lead however, never ask for an explanation before partner has led. That could illegally suggest a lead. And if you want to know about a bid made by dummy and partner is on lead, you will have your answer when dummy comes down, so if you ask, you again transmit unauthorized information to your partner.

Finally, a failure to alert does not automatically means an adjusted score. Only if there were damages <u>caused</u> by the failure to alert, will a director adjust the score.





Good Defense Means Counting and Catering

If you hope to defeat contracts when they can be defeated, you have to religiously count the declarer's and your partner's hand. Counting includes the number of cards in each suit and the high card points. It also includes, naturally, counting tricks. Here is a hand where counting and catering can make the difference:

In a knockout match against experienced opponents, you pick up, vulnerable against not,

- KJ104
- ♥ AK10932
- J9

RHO is in first chair and starts proceedings slowly with 1. The auction, however, quickly spirals out of control:

RHO 1♦	You 1♥	LHO Dbl	Partner 3♥	_
4.	4¥	Dbl	preemptive Pass	
5♣ Pass	5♥ ?	6♦	Pass	

Now, instead of playing a peaceful heart game (which probably makes) you've been bullied into bidding one more at the five level, and are now forced to try for a different kind of plus. Should you double?

Surely the opponents are going down. The auction is odd however because LHO has first doubled at the four level then reevaluated his hand to bid on over our five level push. Clearly, we can't make 6 ourselves so it must be right to double.

Expecting to beat the hand a least two, you lay down the YA. Dummy appears:

The ♥A can't possibly live because partner has preemptively raised and must have the four remaining hearts. A second trick (besides the A) will have to come from the spade suit.

Sure enough, declarer studies dummy for a minute before calling for a low card. Your partner starts an echo and declarer ruffs with a low diamond. Declarer now plays a diamond to the Ace and a diamond back to his King, partner following. Finally, declarer stuffs you in by leading the &K to your stiff Ace.

Now how do you like your chances?

Before leading to the next trick, be sure to count declarer's hand. your partner's hand and the tricks.

Are you sure you've done the right thing?

Counting

Distribution: Declarer's hand consists of no hearts, five or six diamonds headed by the King and Queen, five or six clubs headed by the King and Queen and the remainder, however many there are. in spades, including possibly, the &Q. Partner's hand is four hearts to the Jack and no other face cards except possibly the AQ. Not much of a preemptive raise whatever they have.

Points: Declarer has 10 or 12, partner has 3 or 1 - ugh.

Tricks: If declarer has six diamonds and five clubs (or six clubs and five diamonds), then he has 11 tricks and you can't exit with a heart because that Queen in dummy will be declarer's 12th trick. You'll have to lead a spade and hope partner has the &Q.



On the other hand, if declarer has five diamonds and five clubs, he has only 10 tricks. Then you can safely exit with the ♥K. He'll be able to pitch only one spade away on dummy's ♥Q leaving him with a spade loser.

Since he has only 10 tricks, you can also afford to give him a trick in spades assuming he has the spade queen.

To summarize, you can't beat the hand if declarer is 6-5 with the ♠Q.

Catering

The task is to cater to both of the other situations: declarer 6-5 no spade queen, declarer 5-5 with the spade queen.

Say you lead a low spade. If declarer doesn't have the Queen, he will just win the Ace in dummy reel off his minor suit winners ending in his hand. You will pitch your \(\psi \text{K}\) only after he has visited dummy for the last time.

What if declarer DOES have the spade queen? Now a low spade will run to his queen and the Ace and 9 of spades in dummy will prevent you from pitching spades. Because dummy is pitching behind you, the ♥Q will be a threat also. You will be squeezed out of your spade guard for declarer's twelfth trick.

Consider what happens though if you lead the ♠K. You will be able to hold onto your ♥K until dummy has no more entries, then you will be able to pitch it to hold onto your remaining spades. The entry to dummy's threats, the ♠A, is knocked out prematurely. Try it.

Did you find the ♠K lead to cater to all of the dangers? YES



Bidding Question

(for intermediate players)

When I have 4 clubs and 4 diamonds, which suit should I open?

Answer.

It depends on the rest of your hand. Anybody who tells you to always open 1♣ or always open 1♦ with 4-4 in the minors should be regarded with suspicion....you must be prepared for your rebid and make it easy for partner to respond.

Let's say that you will open 1♣ more often, but sometime you will have to open 1♦.

♦Kxx ♥xx ♦AQxx **♣**KJxx. (13 HCP)

Open 1. This hand is balanced. It is not a two suiter!

You will rebid 1NT over a 1♥ or 1♠ response or pass over a 1NT response.

(A raise to two spades is acceptable)

Afraid to rebid 1NT over a 14 response? Do not worry about the doubleton heart, just do it!

You would also raise 1+ to two.

You have nothing to gain by opening 1♦. You are ready for everything after a 1♣ opening.

But you could lose by opening 1+ if partner has a weak hand with long clubs.

By opening 1♣, you allow partner to raise your clubs, bid 1♦ or bid a major.

Therefore, on this hand a 14 opening is more flexible.

♠KQxx ♥x ♠AJxx ♠KJxx. Here, if you open 1♣ you will be well placed over any one level suit response partner will make. You can raise ♦s or ♠s if he bids them, or you can bid 1♠ over a 1♥ response. How high should I raise partner you ask? With 14 HCP plus 3 dummy points for the singleton, your hand is worth a total of 17 support points. This is a text book raise to the three level in either ♦s or ♠s

Now change the order of your major suits.

♦X ♥KQxx **♦**AJxx **♣**KJxx.

If you open 1♣ and partner respond 1♠, (very likely), you are not so well placed.

You cannot reverse in one of your other suits, (you are not strong enough) and a 1NT rebid is misleading with a small singleton. This is not a balanced hand.

But if you open 1♦, you can rebid 2♠ over a 1♠ or 1NT response. (If partner responds 1NT, he doesn't have ♦s, ♥s or ♠s.)

Therefore he has ♠s and less than 4♠s. You have only 1♠.

The opponents have nine or more ♠s. 2♠ will be a better contract than 1NT!

(Of course, if partner surprises you with a 1♥ response, you will raise to three)





Stuart's World - Reversed

Barry Yamanouchi (W) and I (E) were playing together - we had only played together a couple times in the last year.

This was the auction:

North East South West 1S 2H 3H 4H P P 5H P 6D P 6S 7H*

*Barry commented: "I don't sacrifice enough". This turned out to be a prophetic comment!

**Reluctantly, as I wanted to double 6S!

This was my hand:

T97653

We only have 1 spade to lose, as the Heart K is singleton (perforce). I got a diamond lead, so was able to set up the clubs to pitch the losing spade from East.

It turns out we could beat 6S double-dummy, but I don't know if I would find the diamond switch. Although Barry will discourage on the club lead, and the 6D bid points to shortness in partner's hand.

The NS hands:

North S AT84 H K D KQJT843 C 8 South S KJ9763 H -D A97 C QJ42

I guess Barry was right: he doesn't sacrifice enough!

Give Me A (Computer) Hand

Penticton provided a lot of freaks - we start with:

You are Vulnerable, they are not.

South passes - you?

If the vulnerability were reversed, there is something to be said for opening 5S. You are almost guaranteed 8 tricks and down 3 is a fine result. Here, even 4S is too high, as partners hand turns out to be totally useless.

♣ 4♥ QJ964♠ A82♣ J1072

Next:


S: AQJ109764

C: 74



You are the Dealer, again Vulnerable against Non-Vulnerable. This time you have "ONLY" 8 spades and an AQ besides. You open 1S - P - 1NT (forcing) by partner. You? Anything higher than 2 spades lands you in trouble as the full deal was:



Then:

S: AKQJ1086

H: 10

D: Q97

C: Q4

Not Vulnerable against Vulnerable

You have 7 spades, but here even 6 spades turns out to be a cheap sacrifice, as they are cold for 6 clubs.





East and S Pass, West opens 1C, you? When you double, does South bid length (2D, which gets you to 7D) or strength in the other major (2H) which probably gets you to 6S. Of course you can only get to 7D when you can use Exclusion Blackwood (5C).

Another sequence could be:

E	S	W	N ASS SECTION
P	P	1C	X
P	2H	P	2S
P	3D	P	5C (Exclusion Blackwood)
P	5H	P	7D

Some joker opened the West hand IS –P-P-X All bass down "only" 6 for 1400 which bests those in 6 spades and 7 diamonds but not those in 6 diamonds making 7.




Which Way Home?

Here are a couple of double dummy problems taken from actual play. Both of them make you think ahead in the play and defense. In each of them, decide who can prevail: declarer or defense. Warning: the second one is much more difficult than the first.



After West overcalled in spades and East doubled diamonds for the lead, North-South judged to try for the 11 trick game in clubs rather than risk 3NT with just one spade stopper. Can 5 & always be made? Try it on a diamond lead and then on a trump lead.





At some tables N-S reached 6 \$\text{ by South, which seems a little high.} Can 6 \$\text{ be made?}\$

Consider opening leads in all four suits before deciding.

Solutions:

1. 5 🏶 can always be made.

a) Lead: • 4

b) Lead: . 2.

Now ruffing two hearts in dummy doesn't look so good as you have to shorten your own trumps by ruffing spades in order to get back to hand. However, give it a try:

Win the 40 10 in hand, play three rounds of hearts, ruffing in dummy, Ace of spades, ruff a spade, ruff the last heart in dummy, cash the diamond Ace, ruff a spade and play a diamond to the Jack. East is on play with only a trump and two diamonds. If he returns a trump, rise with the Ace and lead a diamond to the dummy. West can ruff with his King but then completes your crossruff by leading his last spade.

What made it possible was that East could not lead a defensive winner (spade) at a critical time in the play so your trumps all scored. The way home was quite easy. Note that 3NT is hopeless after a spade lead.

2. 6 * can always be made.

But it took Deep Finesse and an hour of late night discussion to convince four of us that there are two completely different lines, depending on the opening lead (and defense continuations).


a) Lead: A

Ruff in hand and lead a diamond ducking to East's Queen. On any return, you can complete a dummy reversal, using the & Q as a late entry to dummy to pull the last trump. E.g. club return – win the & A in hand, heart to dummy, ruff a spade, heart to dummy, ruff the & Q with your last trump in hand, lead a club to dummy's Queen, draw the last trump, return to hand with the & K and take the diamond finesse. That's twelve tricks via 3 spade ruffs in hand, 3 trumps in dummy, 2 diamonds and 4 clubs.


b) Lead: low diamond

Duck to East's Queen. On a spade return, ruff in hand and revert to the dummy reversal line of part a). On a trump return, you don't have enough entries to ruff 3 spades and get back to dummy to draw the last trump. Fortunately, dummy has the Queen of spades which can operate as a threat against West who also holds the rest of the diamond suit.

You have 5 trump tricks, 2 diamonds (after the finesse) and 4 clubs bringing your total up to 11. So cash 3 rounds of trumps ending in hand, then lead the • J to make West commit himself.




J lead. If West covers, you ruff a spade to hand, cash the last trump pitching a spade and end with four rounds of clubs ending in dummy:



West can't hold a diamond guard and the high spade. That was a simple squeeze.



If West doesn't cover, cash one more round of trumps, pitching a spade and then cash four rounds of clubs ending in dummy:



If West has held onto a second diamond to go with his King, then he has bared the spade Ace – ruff a spade to hand and return a diamond to dummy to cash the good Queen. If he has held onto a second spade, then he has bared his diamond King – cash the diamond Ace and ruff a spade to hand. That was a ruffing squeeze.

- c) Trump lead. Win in dummy, lead a club to hand and duck diamond to East. Revert to the line in b) on any return.
- d) Club lead. Win in hand a duck a diamond to East. Revert to a) or b) depending on East's return.

In this hand the order of card play made a huge difference and the way home was difficult to ferret out as it involved advanced techniques: dummy reversal, a simple squeeze and a ruffing squeeze.



Too Much Information

I admit I am an "information junky". When I pick up the newspaper to read, I also, automatically pick up a pen for underlining ideas or startling facts. I'll create piles of articles I deem worthy of referring to at some future date. When I'm driving, CBC is my radio station of choice. Did you know? About a quarter of families on our planet survive on two dollars a day. The most dangerous spot to be during an earthquake is not near the epicenter, as I had thought, but near the fault line. [Sort of gives a perspective on a game of cards, right?]

As far back as I remember, when I had a paper to prepare or a project to develop, I would surround myself with ratty bits of notes and quotes. Scattered about would be books sprouting bookmarks, folded corner pages or underlined passages. Out of this mess, I would make a mind map. Then I would come to some conclusions I could live with and defend. Even without a specific project, I continue to be a pack rat of information . I have difficulty being separated from books. I never go anywhere without a book. My friends remind me when I had been referred to as the lady with the big purse. Now you know what was in it. Important information.

You can imagine what my office looks like after I had developed a passion for bridge 12 years ago! The cook books lost the space war. I took lessons online to learn SAYC, then at the same site, for 2/1. I worked with a terrific mentor for years. I joined a study group. As proof, I have a closet full of folders from every project. But that wasn't enough. A generous player from the states raved about a bridge system he had put together after years of studying all systems. "The best of the best", he said. "Sure, I'll look at it," was my response. My purse was big enough to accommodate the forty page printout. Another partner wanted to play a Weak No-trump. Sure. I located a book on-line. I liked the system and faithfully reviewed it prior to our game every second week or so. Bridge wasn't my only project over the past few years, but it was a major focus and continues to be so. I took the ACBL teaching course. Why not add on the teaching course for cruises? The Director's course was intriguing and challenging. "Blue air" floated in my office at times when I was learning to manipulate the computer program, ACBL Score. All in all, over the years, I was busier than a bus boy in downtown Vancouver during the Winter Olympics 2010.

But something didn't feel just right. The game of bridge was beginning to lose..... the element of fun. Although I enjoyed both playing and directing. I didn't like doing both at the

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game. This latter was my mode of operation to implement my new directing skills. Just as you rarely see two people dressed exactly alike, you rarely find bridge players who have identical systems. Unless, of course, it is a longstanding partnership. I have many partners face-to-face and online. No problem. For each one, I prepared a folder for notes. Eventually my head was a merry-go-round of systems and conventions and individual preferences. In the middle of a game, after the bidding sequence 1D-(P)-1H-(P)-2NT...I would be casting about: Does this partner play, New Minor Force, Wolfe Signoff, transfers ON or does he just bid naturally? With another partner, I might be trying to recall, which version of Ogust he played? There are only about twelve of them. Those few minutes before the game when we planned to quickly review our card were frequently used instead to share a 'super" idea one of us has just read in the last Bridge Bulletin. Bridge is a game of communication. Sometimes during the bidding sequence conversation, I was "lost for words". Sometimes I even forgot the words. Either I forgot the convention or I was muddled about what was "standard'. For example, without prior discussion, what would you assume the "standard " response is after the sequence (above) 1D-(P)-1H-(P)-2NT-?

I feel well qualified to speculate about the problem of TOO MUCH INFORMATION.

I have always believed, and still believe, the human brain is a powerful tool. Too little information is an insult to the potential of the brain and results in inferior conclusions and false believes. There is, however, a point, when the mind cannot deal with the ballooning information that currently surrounds us. John Naisbitt, author of the Megatrend books and Mind Set!, says simply don't bother trying to keep up with information, it's impossible. The key, he writes, is how we process information and experience. The first step is selecting only the "ripe fruit", the relevant or significant bits of information. He introduces eleven mindsets, fundamental attitudes, which will help to bring clarity to confusion. Some of these mindsets I plan to introduce as I continue to explore bridge and information overload.

My favorite quote about too much information:

"Getting information off the internet is like getting a drink from a fire hydrant." Mitchell Kapor
