FROM THE KITCHEN TO THE CHATEAU By Kathy Griffiths

Jane Youngberg had an idea.

What if there were a duplicate bridge club in Surrey where new players could feel at home?—welcome, respected, comfortable and able to learn duplicate without feeling like fools?

Youngberg, a retired math teacher, teacher trainer and curriculum developer, knew she had the skills to make it happen.

It all started five years ago. Youngberg had been playing kitchen bridge with friends in White Rock when she discovered that duplicate bridge was "so much better a game." Three years after starting duplicate, she became a Life Master; two years later she became a Silver Life Master.

Along with John Lien, manager of the Peace Arch Duplicate Club, she put on the first course, Introduction to Duplicate, a learning program for new players. The second course was done with the help of Shirley Laidlaw.

"I realized that new duplicate players needed to come to a club where they could feel totally comfortable and encouraged," says Youngberg. "Many duplicate players are so good and so quick that as a beginner you feel pressured, discouraged and totally beat up. You don't know the rules and it's too frustrating. It's a tough environment."

"I asked myself, 'why does it have to be this way?"

So Youngberg invited John Demeulemeester to join her in starting a new Surrey duplicate club.

Demeulemeester, who has played bridge for 40 years, duplicate for 30 years, and is soon to achieve Gold Life Master ranking, normally plays at the Vancouver Bridge Centre but was willing to go to Surrey. Youngberg says Demeulemeester is perfect for the task. "The players just love him. He's so laid back and encouraging."

They offered a 12 week course Introduction to Duplicate which drew about 70 players. And that was the beginning of Duplicate Lite in Surrey. This new duplicate bridge club opened in April, 2011, bringing the total number of ACBL clubs in Surrey to four. All of these clubs are non-profit.

Now Duplicate Lite has over 80 regulars who come every Thursday from 9:45 AM to 1 PM to the Chateau Cargill at 3550 King George Boulevard in South Surrey.

The Chateau is a pleasant event venue popular for weddings and conferences with attractive space for many bridge tables.

Duplicate Lite has two sections – one for new players with fewer than 50 master points, and an open section.

The club draws people from White Rock, Surrey, Delta, Langley, and even some from Bellingham.

"We have a huge community of baby boomers who are just retiring" says Youngberg.

As a former elite and world-ranked badminton player who represented Canada for a decade in world championships, she enjoys the competitive aspect of duplicate bridge as do others who join ACBL clubs.

Jane and John together put on lessons each Thursday. They offer hand records so players can go over the hands they played and figure out what they did right and wrong. And the club even has electronic scoring which is still rare in the Lower Mainland.

Jane says the players have been very supportive by donating funds and helping with the many tasks necessary to run a club. In its first year, Duplicate Lite was able to purchase over \$10000 worth of equipment and materials.

Players pay \$7 at each weekly game which includes hand records, coffee and snacks.

As ACBL directors, Jane and John are there so a player can call a director to sort out a problem when there appears to be an infraction of ACBL rules. If an infraction occurs, the director gives the options --- another way to help players learn.

Players are offered name tags as well to make it easy for players to get to know each other by name, adding to the friendliness of the games.

Regular player Margaret Gordon of Crescent Beach says she enjoys the way Youngberg "explains things so well. New Life Masters are now being created at the club."

"And it's a huge group of people to grow with and travel with for bridge."

A footnote: To get to the Chateau Cargill from Vancouver take Highway 99 south, and take Exit 10 (to Crescent Beach). From there go south on King George Blvd. Then just past the first light, make a left onto Winter Crescent. The Chateau Cargill is right there on the corner of King George Blvd. and Winter Crescent.

STELLA ALLISTON, 1920-2012

Stella was survived by her son, Robert Alliston, six grandchildren and eight great grandchildren. Her husband, Robert, predeceased her. For decades she was a fixture in North Shore games and elsewhere. Stella was a formidable player achieving platinum status. She got most of her masterpoints at a time when they were far more difficult to obtain than now. Stella always got on very well with her partners and was also gracious with her opponents. She continued playing effectively almost to the date of her death, which was on October 13, 2012.

GIVE ME A HAND: SNAPSHOTS FROM SAN FRANCISCO--Jörg Schneider

I. A Wily Defender

As dealer, both sides vulnerable I held: ♥QJT3 ◆AKQ43 ♣J732.

The bidding proceeded as follows:

South (me)	West	North	East
1+	pass (!)	IΨ	I de
2♥	24(!!)	pass	pass
3♥	34(!!!)	47	pass
Pass	44	pass	pass
?			

Well, I doubled. The spades didn't break, so we should have a nice penalty. The lead was the Ace of diamonds, and, when dummy hit the table, I asked to be excused, since the full deal was as follows:

Dealer: South.

North: \$2 \$6542 \$1865 \$A864;

West: **≜**AKQJ985 ♥98 ♦72 **♣**T5; East: **≜**T7643 ♥AK7 ♦T9 **♣**KQ9

South: ♥ Q|T3 + AKQ43 ♠|732

I was correct in one aspect of the hand: the spades did not break; partner had all! of the missing ones.

II. Freaks abounded: here is one of them. As South, vulnerable v. not vulnerable, I held: ♠JT985432 ♥6 ◆Q32 ♣5.

West dealt and passed. The auction proceeded as follows:

West	North	East	South
pass	I (I)	2+	3♠
pass	44 (2)	(all pass)	

- (I) As a matter of style, I would open one club and rebid hearts twice (see full deal below)
- (2) A sporting raise based on a singleton.

For some obscure reason, West led a club and the contract made. The full deal was as follows:

Dealer: West.

North: **♠7** ♥ AKJT8 ♦5 **♠**AKJT84

West: ♠A6 ♥9432 ♦984 ♠Q972 East: ♠KQ ♥Q75 ♦AKJT76 ♠63

South: ♠JT985432 ♥6 ♦Q32 ♣5

On a Diamond lead followed by a trump switch, you are down one and can now blame partner for raising you on a singleton!

The following two deals (same round) used up my quota of high card points for the rest of the year.

First Hand: North deals, neither side vulnerable. As West you hold:
•AKQ982 *K8 •AKQ12. The bidding proceeds as follows:

North East South West I♦ pass I♥ ?

I bid a straightforward Six Spades and on the lead of the Heart Ace it was easy going. The full deal:

Dealer: North.

North: **≜64** ♥A2 **♦**AQT7532 **♣64**

West: **≜AKQ982** ♥K8 **≜AKQJ2** East: **≜T73** ♥T74 **♦**J964 **≜**T98 South: **≜**J5 ♥QJ9653 **♦**K8 **≜**753

So long as trumps break 2-2 no lead can hurt it. At some tables, West, after the same start, bid 2 hearts (showing spades and clubs) and, with East the declarer, the Queen of Hearts spells doom!

The companion hand was as follows:

Dealer: East. North: ♦42 ♥JT762 ♦654 ♣JT9

West: ♠A3 ♥AQ54 ♦A ♠AKQ863 East: ♠KJ865 ♥K93 ♦KQJ9 ♠2
South: ♠QT97 ♥8 ♦T8732 ♠754

With clubs breaking 3-3 Seven No Trump made easily. Those in 6 Clubs received a very poor score. As a matter of fact, on a hand like this, when you stop in Six No Trump (as we did) you pray that the clubs don't break so that those greedy b___ds who bid 7NT go down!

Once at a NABC tournament I was kibitzing Rodwell. As is his wont, he took a long time to plan the play of a particular hand. After the hand was over, with nothing unusual having happened, his screenmate, a Polish star named "Pepsi" asked him, "What were you worried about?"

Rodwell replied, "The club ruff obviously" "But there was no club ruff". "No, not this time", said Rodwell.

With the above as a hint, see how you do here. The contract is 4S and the opening lead is the heart Jack.

Dummy ≜AJx ♥Q +Kxx ≜KJxxxx
You ≜QTxxxx ♥Ax +Qxx ♣Qx

The opening lead is the heart Jack. The play to the first few tricks goes:

- (I) V J, Q, x x
- (2) **≜**x, x, Q, A
- (3) *****T, x, A, x
- (4) ♦x, Q, x, x defined to head and no bine as height xill be sweething times a hind to

Now what? Does it matter if this is a team game or matchpoints? What is the problem?

The problem is a possible diamond ruff. Did you notice that Left Hand Opponent played the diamond Ten, then a low diamond on the second round? If you play a low spade to the Jack, Right Hand Opponent wins and returns a diamond for his partner to ruff. Down 1.

To guarantee your contract at teams, play a spade to the Ace and a low spade. Even if the spades are 3-1, there is no problem. If the short diamond hand wins the second spade, he can't get his partner in to lead a diamond, and, if the long diamond hand wins, his partner has no spade to ruff with.

At matchpoints you have a tougher decision to make. The contract is normal; you would expect most pairs to be there. If the spade finesse wins you can make an overtrick. If it fails and there is a diamond ruff, you still make four spades. To go down, several things must go wrong. The diamonds must split 2-5 (16%) and the spade finesse must fail (50%) and the left hand opponent must have two or three spades (90%) a total of about 7%. Since the chances of an overtrick are over 90% you should go for it, and go down one in the process; hope you have an understanding partner.

2/Tournament Attendance

 The attendance at both the September and November sectionals increased over last year. The Unit employed electronic scoring machines for the first time and the membership reacted positively. The chief Tournament Director, Matt Smith, felt we could get by with one director fewer because the scoring machines decreased the directors' work load. As a result, these machines will enable the Unit to reduce labour expenses for directors and caddies in future tournaments. IMP Leagues: Unit Vice President Kai Zhou also serves as IMP League commissioner. We have 10 A/X teams and 5 Flight B teams. I have also recruited 8 Flight C Non-Life Master teams. You can check on the match results at our website.

3/Education program for Intermediate/Newcomer Players

 On October 27-28, we combined the Education Weekend with the Future Stars Tournament. We received a favourable response. We had 54 students participate in the two days of lessons and the tournament generated 42 tables of players. We even managed to make a modest profit with the event, something which has not often occurred in recent years. The next Future Stars Event is scheduled for April 27-28, 2013.

4/Community Service

 Ms. Lorna Smith, Coordinator of the College of the Retired (Burnaby) made a written request of the Unit Board as to whether they could recommend an instructor to fill in for eight weeks while their regular instructor went on holiday. I volunteered my service for this role, in the hope that I can introduce the players to duplicate bridge.

5/Financial Report

 Our Treasurer, Robin Hart, reported that from June to December, 2012 our Unit maintained a healthy balance sheet and substantial financial reserves. Most of the events sponsored by the Unit have been successful due to the hard work and support of Unit members.

DISTRICT 19 NEWS

The next few years promise to be an exciting time for DINO (District 19). First, our national director, David Mamula, has been elected as the ACBL president for 2013, which should give our district a higher profile in the months ahead. We have not had an ACBL director president from District 19 since Dudley Brown served in that position over 20 years ago.

At our board meeting in Olympia in October, we reached a number of decisions which should interest the Unit.

- 1. The board elected Cam Doner as District 19 president for 2013. Although presidents are elected annually, our president traditionally serves for two years in a row, so we can that expect Cam will be president both in 2013 and 2014. It has been a dozen years since DINO had a president from Unit 430 (I was DINO president in 1999-2000.)
- 2. The board has conditionally approved making Vancouver the site of an annual regional beginning in April, 2014. This would give us fixed regionals in Vancouver in April, Penticton in June, and Lynnwood in August. The question DINO now has to wrestle with is how to accommodate all of the other areas of the District.

The Olympia tournament was a success, so that area will want another regional soon. Spokane, Wenatchee and Tri-Cities (Richland-Kennewick-Pasco, WA) would like to host regionals on a semi-regular basis. Vancouver Island will also certainly want a regional from time to time, especially if next spring's regional at the Pearkes Centre works out.

We have discussed adding a fifth regional (as long as Penticton gets over 3,000 tables we are allowed a fifth regional) or going to a split-site regional. I am not in favour of either of these options as I believe it would dilute attendance too much, but would like your input since I am, after all, your representative.

- 3. Cam was having some issues with the River Rock contract and the board gave him the authority to book an alternative venue if he felt that would be better for us. He has done so and I can confirm that the 2014 Vancouver regional will now be held at the Grand Villa Casino in Burnaby I sent them a deposit a couple of weeks ago, so it is a done deal.
- 4. For the first time in a long time, all four of our 2012 regionals made money and we now have significant reserves in the bank. (Thank you to everyone who worked so hard to make Vancouver such a success!!!) As a result, we have decided to drop the card fees from \$13.50/person/session to

- \$13/person/session for 2013. It is not a huge drop but when was the last time card fees dropped? With the reintroduction of the PST I expect we will again only have to charge 5% instead of 12% on our Canadian entry fees (it is included in the fee) and if the Canadian Dollar stays strong, that will also help. If we have another good year in 2013, I will push hard to drop the fees even more. Stay tuned and help that happen by supporting the tournaments.
- 5. Related to the above, we have decided to accept foreign money at par at all of our tournaments provided the exchange rate is within five per cent. That has applied to US dollars at our Canadian tournaments for several years but it now will also apply to the use of CDN\$ at our US tournaments.
- 6. Larry and Lynda have now retired and we have a new supplier David Taylor of Seattle. He calls himself TournTables. We are working out a new contract with him and expect it will not be much of an increase over 2012.
- 7. At my urging, the board agreed to hold split finals for the Grand National Teams. The Super and B flights will be held one weekend and the A & C flights another weekend. Provided they qualify, teams will be able to participate in both events. A "B" Team can compete in both A and B and a C team can compete in both B and C. The district finals will alternate between Seattle and Vancouver, with one final in each city each year. We haven't decided who is hosting what in 2013, but if, for example, Vancouver hosts the Super and B flights in 2013, we would host the A and C finals in 2014 and vice-versa. That should make it easier for our players to participate by reducing some of the travel costs. It is worth participating since the winning team in each flight gets a \$1400 subsidy from the District to compete in the National finals.
