## Mini-Lesson 3: Showing values in Competitive Auctions - Cuebids

- 1. The last 2 weeks we've discussed competitive auctions where you can bid more with a 9c fit, and may bid more with an 8c fit (or less!) to prevent the Opp's from playing at the 2 level.
- 2. But how does partner know if you are just competing? or you have a hand with values where game may be a possibility?

(1H) 1S (2H) ? what does 2S show here? 6-9 points and 3+ support. what would 3S show here? 10+ points and 3+ support

What to do you bid with this hand?

1. **T976 5 K987 Q876**? 8 support points. 2S?

What about 2. **Q54 54 AT92 QJ54**? 10 support points. 2S? 3S?

3. **Q9765 5 K87 K874**? 11 support points. 3S? 4S?

4. **JT8764 - KQT4 876?** 11 support points. 4S?

5. **Q987** 5 **AQ92 AQ54**? 17 support points. 3S? 4S?

- 3. How can partner tell the difference if we use the same bid to cover such different hands? Modern bridge uses the Opp's interference in the auction to help distinguish between different hands. Their bidding gives us more bids to use!
- 4. What is a cuebid raise? making a cuebid bidding their suit -- is used to show all hands with support for P's suit and 10+ points.

Which means you don't need a jump to 3 of P's suit to show that hand. Jump raises can be preemptive (using the Law of Total Tricks, discussed last week).

**5. So:** Hand 1: you would bid 3S (preemptive)

Hand 2: you could bid 2S or 3H. Your 10 points is on the cusp, so this is a matter of style. Usually, to show 10+ points, it should be a great 10.

Hand 3: you would bid 3H. If P has 15+ (or a great 14) he will bid game.

Hand 4: you could bid 3H, but 4S directly is probably a better tactical bid.

Hand 5: you would bid 3H. Cuebidding their suit shows limit values or better. If P signs off in 3S, you would bid 4S.

Why not bid 4S right away? It helps P judge what to do later knowing whether you have a preemptive hand (like #4) or a hand with values (like #5). If the opponents decide to bid 5H, P has a better idea whether to double or bid 5S.

- 6. What do you give up if you use a cuebid this way? Standard bridge used a cuebid of the opponent's suit to show a very big hand interested in slam. But that hand comes up very rarely in a competitive auction. Essentially, we exchange a seldom used bid for one that comes up all the time.
- 7. What about when Partner opens the bidding instead of overcalls?
- 1S (2C) ? KT87 5 AQ952 QJ5 too many values for 2S or 3S, and 4S could be a preemptive hand.

The answer? The cuebid raise! 3C to show limit values or better and 3+ support.
